## MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

I was recently asked to speak at the Oak Mountain Athletic Boosters Meeting, and I decided to share with you some of the points I addressed.

You should know that OMHS is recognized as a top school not just in this area, but in the state. Good schools play a critical role in maintaining and enhancing property values in North Shelby County and Indian Springs.

Since its inception in 1999, the Athletic Booster Club has provided funding for facilities and coaching supplements to allow OMHS to compete at the highest level with the surrounding schools and communities. They are competing with Hoover, Mountain Brook, Homewood and Vestavia for example. The Shelby County School Board cannot give funds to support extracurricular activities. Whether we like it or not, parents and kids look not just at the academic quality of a school, but almost equally at the extracurricular activities it offers and the quality of its facilities.

I let them know that ISV is supportive and proud of our school system and understands how important it is to the community. We fought for school security and stood with the Sheriff for the presence of School Resource Officers in our schools. We do realize that Indian Springs is a small community without much commercialization or tax base to help support the schools as cities like Pelham have.

I reminded them that our mission statement addresses preserving the beauty and tranquility of this valley. To borrow a phrase: “PAVING PARADISE TO PUT UP A PARKING LOT” is not meant to happen everywhere! This protects the schools by limiting excessive adjacent commercialization and keeps the learning atmosphere peaceful.

I encouraged them, especially those who live in Indian Springs with kids in the Oak Mountain schools, to attend council meetings and town functions. I also encourage you, especially those of you who no longer have kids in school, to participate in their events such as Friday night games and fund raisers. News of the school events and current projects will be more available soon as we are incorporating a section of *The Village Voice* for each of the schools in our town to submit articles.

The schools are a vital part of our community. I truly believe by bringing the schools into the community, we will be bringing the community into the schools. I hope to see more of each of you in the future.

# TOWN COUNCIL MEETINGS

August 2014

## *Town Council Minutes*

The Indian Springs Village Town Council Minutes may now be accessed on the ISV web site. Therefore, beginning in this issue of *The Village Voice* you will find a summary of the highlights of the actions taken at the ISV Town Council meetings. ### **August 5, 2014:**

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at the Town Hall on Tuesday, August 5, 2014. Councilman Herb Robins called the meeting to order at 7:05 P.M. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. The Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present except Mayor Bell-Guercio.

The minutes of July 15, 2014 were reviewed. Councilman Trammell made a motion to include a statement made by him at the council meeting 7-1-14. The motion did not receive a second. A discussion ensued and Councilman Robins made a motion to end the debate and Councilperson Harrington seconded the motion. The vote was four yes and one no. The minutes were approved as written with the exception of a typographical error.

Deputy Derek Dixon was in attendance and he introduced the new deputy for ISV, James Sellers. Robins thanked Deputy Dixon for his friendship and service to our community.

Councilman Mendel reported that he is working on a new ordinance that will update Ordinance 2005-004 and will e-mail to everyone for their review. He also reported that he has started work on the 2015 budget and he will send his work via e-mail for review and discussion.

Harrington informed the

council that the grass has been cut at the residence on Spring Garden Street. She advised that the property has been purchased and we should no longer have issues concerning the weeds. She also updated the council concerning a conversation she had with the attorney of the owner of the Pawnee Drive property. Some progress is being made. A proposal should be submitted for the cleanup in the near future.

Councilman Stauss reported a problem with TekLink and the inability to upload to our website. Also, he has sent a test email out from Constant Contact; progress is ongoing.

Trammell reported the need to establish a list of manufactured homes that were grandfathered into the town. Since manufactured homes are ordinance prohibited, such a document should exist. He is working on this project.

Robins gave the Fire Chief Report since Chief Tyler was unable to attend the meeting. There were a total of 162 calls; 56 fire and 106 medical related. He also brought to everyone's attention the article in the Shelby County Reporter concerning the donation of North Shelby District's old fire engine to the Kingdom Volunteer Fire Department.

Robins introduced Bryan Fuller, President OMHS Athletic Booster Club. Mr. Fuller detailed the history of the club along with their debt situation (the Booster Club built the stadium at Herdmont Park). He addressed the difficulty of meeting their debt obligation along with the need to continue improving the facilities in order to compete within the category of their athletic program. Surrounding schools are helped with funding by the cities, however, since OMHS is a county school, this help does not exist. He commented on the Community Summit being held August 11th where the goal is to bring the financial needs to the attention of the community. Also, one of the biggest fund raisers is the Sports Festival Fish Fry at Herdmont Park on Saturday August 16th. The

council agreed to send out E-Blasts' in order to notify ISV residents of upcoming functions in an effort to gain community support.

Robins informed the council that a letter from our city attorney went out concerning the junk vehicle issue on Woodfern and explained that if a vehicle does not have a current tag, it is considered a junk vehicle. He also commented on the recent burglaries in ISV and advised everyone to be watchful. He thanked Stauss for the E-Blast posted to warn our citizens.

The Mayor asked that Robins remind the council that they need to begin to review the comprehensive plan in order to tweak it over the next few weeks particularly in regard to underground utilities, trees, landscaping, etc. if Highway 119 is ever widened.

Robins adjourned the meeting at 8:05 P.M.

### **August 19, 2014:**

Councilman Mendel presented the proposed budget for FY 2015. The vote to approve the budget will be on the agenda for Sept 2, 2014. Budget information will subsequently be presented on the web site and in the Village Voice. Council person Robins reported the issue with the junked vehicles has been resolved. He also reported he has been in touch with David Johnson from Oak Mountain State Park with regard to the coyote problems. They have hired two trappers to trap in the park area adjacent to ISV. Councilman Trammell presented a declaration for the consideration of the Council to document the manufactured homes that were in place prior to July 1992. The declaration was to document the location and existence of the nine manufactured homes located in ISV grandfathered into the town because they were established prior to the adoption of the ISV Zoning Ordinance that was adopted July 14, 1992. Thus, these homes were classified as non-

conforming uses of the ordinance. The declaration was adopted by the council.

### **August 27, 2014:**

Town Council Work Session:

Items on the agenda for the work session were ISV's MS4 Storm Water Permit; ISV's Comprehensive Plan with respect to underground utilities and landscaping along Highway 119 and a proposed procedural ordinance regarding expenditures of town funds.

ISV Town Engineer Frasier Christy explained ISV's MS4 Storm Water Permit required by ADEM and administered through a cooperative agreement with Shelby County Environmental Services. A discussion was held concerning potential ways to cut the cost of obtaining the necessary permit.

Mayor Guercio led a discussion on ISV's comprehensive plan with respect to protecting and enhancing the 119 corridor. A discussion followed concerning the possibility of underground utilities and landscaping on 119 and the need for an ordinance to address these issues. Councilperson Harrington agreed to further research the legalities of the potential ordinance. Councilman Mendel presented a proposed ordinance that he had researched and drafted which dealt in detail with procedures and controls for the expenditure of town funds. The draft ordinance will be further considered at the next regular council meeting.

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## **SHELBY COUNTY TOURISM**

Chris Hershey, who lives in Vestavia Hills, was the guest speaker for the

August 28 meeting of the Indian Springs Garden Club, beginning at 6:30 p.m. at the Town Hall. He explored the many diverse attractions that Shelby County has to offer to inhabitants and tourists.

He began by noting the phenomenal growth of Shelby County, especially in the last ten years, and explaining that the Tourism Bureau operates from a small portion of the lodging tax charged by hotels and motels countywide. That portion of the lodging tax is used to create events to attract more people and hence to enlarge the county's coffers. Their website, [www.DiscoverShelby.com](http://www.DiscoverShelby.com), has a large chart showing Shelby County Population: 1970 – 2013. In 1970, the population was 38,037; in 2000, it was 143,293; and in 2013, it was 204,180.

The nature of events planned is decided by the predicted economic impact to be had in bringing outside money into Shelby County. He mentioned in particular the three times the 12,000 acre Lay Lake has played host to the Bass Masters Tournament, events that happen at nearby Veterans Park on Valleydale Road, the Alabama Wildlife Center at the almost 10,000 acre Oak Mountain State Park (one of 60 parks throughout the state, including nearby Heardmont) and other attractions. At the ice arena at the Pelham Civic Center, the University of Alabama hockey matches will be held. He also mentioned the three wineries on the winery trail, the University of Montevallo, museums and the Cahaba River. In short, Shelby County, located in the heart of Alabama, has "a little bit of something for everyone," he said.

"Shelby County" and

"Shelby County, Alabama, Economic Development Edition, 2013-2015" were two full-color publications distributed by the speaker.

Eleanor Bennett led the devotional and members enjoyed refreshments brought by President Liz Alosi, Marge Dunn and Ruth Goodwyn.

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## Samuel O. Jones IV IS NOW FULL COLONEL

A ceremony honoring Samuel O. Jones IV, who grew up in Indian Springs, on his promotion to Colonel was held April 28, 2014 at Joint Base San Antonio, Texas.

Colonel (Dr.) Jones is Chief Medicine Consultant to the Air Force Surgeon, assigned to Air Force Medical Operations Agency in San Antonio.

Colonel Jones, who graduated in 1988 from Pelham High School, graduated from the Air Force Academy, located just north of Colorado Springs, Colorado, in 1992 with military distinction. He completed his medical degree from the University of Alabama School of Medicine, Birmingham, and subsequently served at Elgin Air Base as an F-15 flight surgeon for the 60th Fighter Squadron. He completed his internal medicine residency in 2002 and his Cardiology Fellowship in 2005, both at Wilford

Hall Medical Center, Lackland Air Force Base, San Antonio, earning awards in research as well as top teaching fellow. He then performed a Cardiac Electrophysiology fellowship at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston. While there, he earned a Master's Degree in Public Health at the Harvard University School of Public Health.

Prior to his current assignment, Colonel Jones was a staff cardiologist at Wilford Hall Medical Center and San Antonio Military Medical Center, with a focus on sports cardiology and sudden cardiac death. He has over 25 peer reviewed publications and abstracts, holds a position as an Associate Professor of Medicine through the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences and serves on the Board of Governors for the American College of Cardiology.

Colonel Jones and his wife, Leslie, from Oneonta, AL, have three boys, Quinn, Luke and Jake. His mother is Villager Mrs. Leta Jones.


