TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

March 15, 2016

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, March 15, 2016. Mayor Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. The Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present except Councilperson Harrington.

The minutes of March 1, 2016 were reviewed and accepted as written.

Mayor Bell-Guercio introduced Amber Ross; Amber has agreed to serve as manager of the ISV Farmers Market. Councilman Robins made a motion that Council approves the ISV Farmers Market and Board with the following members:

- Amber Ross - Market Manager
- Joan Downs - Council Representative
- John Strozier - Indian Springs First Baptist Church Representative
- CJ Guercio - Board Member
- Brandi White - Board Member

Councilman Mendel seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous.

Local architect Mark Burns presented his guide plans for the bid package for the new "multipurpose building." The plans were reviewed and discussed. The bid package will go out next week. Stauss will send an E-Blast with the RFB.

PAZ Chairman Wayne Jones presented a sub-division request by Wes Davis of Highpointe Properties. His desire is to sub-divide a seven acre parcel into two parcels. The parcel is located on Cahaba Valley Trace. Jones advised the Council that the request went before the PAZ on March 8th and was approved. Councilman Trammell made a motion that Council approves the sub-division request as presented. Mendel seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Robins reported that the Knox box has been installed on the front of the Town Hall and keys are in it. The Knox box will prevent damage to building if there is an alarm and not an actual fire. He also reported that after completing a road survey he has submitted a road paving request to the county. Of the 1.5 miles only .31 miles will be the responsibility of ISV. Roads on the request are; Arrowhead Lane, Auburn Drive, Double Oak Lane, Timber Hill Road and Prairie Road. Robins also requested a cost estimate prior to work.

Mendel presented the February financials and they were discussed. Mendel made a motion to endorse February financials as presented, Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Trammell presented an annexation request for 5526 Parkview Circle. He made a motion to suspend the rules and vote on this annexation. The rollcall vote was

unanimous. He made a motion that the annexation request be accepted as presented. Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Additionally, Trammell presented an annexation request for 2634 Valleydale Road. Inasmuch as this property is located in overlapping police jurisdictions (Indian Springs Village and Hoover), the annexation process must be done in stages. This is the first of eleven stages. Discussion was held concerning the zoning classification of the property (R-4). The consensus of the council was to classify the property as E-1. Robins made a motion to suspend the rules and vote on the annexation request, Mendel seconded. The rollcall vote to suspend the rules was held and was as follows:

- Mendel - yea
- Stauss - yea
- Trammell - nay

Additional discussion was held concerning the zoning classification and another rollcall vote to suspend the rules was held. The results were:

- Bell-Guercio - yea
- Robin - yea
- Mendel - yea
- Stauss - yea
- Trammell - yea

Trammell then made a motion that the annexation request by Five Star Properties be approved as presented. Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

The annual Easter Egg Hunt is ready to go for 2016.

Joan Downs, Town Clerk, presented a bid for Christmas Decorations and/or seasonal banners, to be used in our town either during the holidays or seasonally, to the Council. The idea of branding and identifying our Town was discussed. More ideas and discussions will be on going.

Bell-Guercio adjourned the meeting at 9:20 P.M.

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TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

April 5, 2016

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, April 5, 2016. Mayor Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. Following the Pledge of Allegiance, the Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present.

The minutes of March 15, 2016 were reviewed and accepted as written.

Architect Mark Burns reported to the council that the advertised pre-bid meeting was held and two potential bidders were in attendance. He explained the bidding process and gave a short overview of the two potential bidders. The sealed bid openings will be held April 7th at the Town Hall. A special council meeting has been called the evening of April 7th to review and discuss the bids.

PAZ Chairman, Wayne Jones, reviewed the sub-division request approved by the PAZ committee to the Council. After lengthy discussion an ordinance issue was raised and the request was tabled until further clarification.

Fire Chief Tyler reported that the Fire Department is flow testing the fire hydrants and advised that citizens may see tinted and or cloudy water; he explained this is normal and will not last long. He also noted the water is safe to drink. The testing started in April and will continue for three months. Not all hydrants are tested at once which is why it will be for this length of time.

Council Robins informed the council that he had been in contact with Scott Holladay who is in charge of the county roads. He reported that Timber Hill Road and Old Mill Court are scheduled for paving this year. He will notify ISV of their portion of the cost prior to work.

Councilperson Harrington discussed the fact that our current Town Attorney works pro-bono and ISV should consider a fee schedule for his work. The Mayor will have a discussion with the attorney and report back to the council.

Councilman Trammell presented the second of the eleven step process of annexing 2634 Valleydale Road. Trammell made a motion to suspend the rules and the roll call vote was unanimous. He then made a motion that the council consider the second of the eleven step annexation request as presented. Robins seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Additionally, Trammell presented an ordinance for the Mayor to direct the disposal of two buildings which are not needed for municipal or public purposes. Harrington made a motion to suspend the rules and Robins seconded. The roll call vote was unanimous. Trammell made a motion to accept the ordinance as presented. Harrington seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Per the request of Amy Easton, the council agreed to make "no glitter" part of the Town Hall Rental Agreement.

Ed Whatley, PE generously volunteered to be the point person for the council in regard to the construction of the new multi-purpose building. Ed is a practicing engineer and the council eagerly accepted his offer.

Bell-Guercio adjourned the meeting at 8:21 P.M.

TOWN COUNCIL SPECIAL MEETING

April 7, 2016

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, April 7, 2016. Mayor Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. The Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present except Councilmen Jack Mendel and Brian Stauss.

Local architect Mark Burns presented to the Council the results of the sealed bid opening which took place April 7, 2016 at 10:00 A.M. He reported that only one vendor submitted a bid. The details and price were discussed extensively. Ultimately, Councilman Trammell made a motion to suspend the rules in order to vote on the resolution. A roll call vote was taken and the vote was unanimous. Councilperson Harrington then made a motion to accept Resolution 04-07-2016-01 giving Bennett Building, LLC the authority to construct the multi-purpose building for a price of \$227,482.00.

Mayor Bell-Guercio adjourned the meeting at 7:32 p.m.

GARDENERS LEARN HOW TO ATTRACT MONARCH BUTTERFLIES

Patricia Tate of Gardendale talked to the Indian Springs Garden Club about the monarch butterfly at the Thursday evening, April 28 meeting at the Town Hall. The monarch, its life cycle, migratory habits, threats of extinction, and how to create a butterfly garden were all covered.

The brilliant orange and black monarchs call the Americas home. Their migration takes them as far north as Canada, and during the winter months, as far south as Mexico City. A single monarch can travel hundreds to thousands of miles. They follow an internal “compass” that points them in the right direction each spring and fall.


The host plant for the monarch is the milkweed, beautiful, poisonous to predators, but not to monarchs. On the milkweeds they lay their eggs. In the caterpillar stage they live exclusively on milkweed plants, but adults feed on nectar from a wide range of flowers, including milkweeds. The typical lifespan of the monarch is only a few weeks, with about three to five generations born each spring and summer, with most of the offspring not living beyond five weeks. The exception is the last generation born at the end of summer. The last generation overwinters in Mexico until early spring, when they fly north to the southern United States and breed.

Perils to the monarch include perhaps the biggest of all, insecticides that kill their milkweed food; habitat loss, such as forests being cut down; hurricanes and extreme cold.

What we can do: plant milkweed. There are three kinds that grow well in Alabama. Plant nectar plants such as astors and Mexican sunflowers. Read books on the subject, such as *Butterflies of Alabama*. Also, talk to road crews about leaving flowers along the highways instead of mowing them. Most of all, avoid insecticides, and remember that monarchs do the necessary job of pollinating your garden. Ms. Tate highly recommended seeing *Flight of the Butterfly*, a movie being shown in IMAX theaters across the country. (McWane Center or Patton Creek in Birmingham.)

The Garden Club welcomed a new member, Pat Beavers, and our new club president, Mickey Farmer, who conducted the brief business meeting following the speaker’s presentation and a devotional and prayer by Eleanor Bennett. Our president asked for volunteers for offices that need to be filled: vice-president, secretary, and hospitality chairman. Jennifer Bondi is treasurer for the forthcoming year. Liz Alosi was profusely thanked for having served the past four years as president.

The next meeting of the Garden Club, our annual plant exchange, will be May 26, beginning at 6:30 p.m. at the Town Hall Pavilion.



IN THE GARDEN...

Winter is behind us and you know spring has sprung because the bugs are out in full force. After you eradicate those pesky bugs with this all natural formula, sit back and enjoy a great summer salad on the patio.

ALL NATURAL BUG SPRAY

*Makes 12 ounces
(large batch that should last all summer)*

Ingredients:

50 drops of Citronella essential oils
50 drops of Eucalyptus essential oils
50 drops of Lemongrass essential oils
8 ounces Witch Hazel
2 ounces Jojoba Oil (optional)
2 ounces water
16 ounce glass spray bottle

1. Add 8 ounces of Witch Hazel to the 16 ounce glass bottle. Then add 2 ounces of jojoba oil to add a moisturizing effect to the spray.
2. Add 50 drops of each of the essential oils.
3. Finally, add approximately 2 ounces of water. Shake well before using.



SEVEN LAYER SALAD



5 cups chopped green leaf lettuce
2 cups seeded, chopped tomatoes
2 cups chopped yellow bell pepper
1 (12 ounce) package frozen green peas, thawed
2 cups chopped radishes
2 cups diced seedless cucumber
Seven-Layer Salad Dressing (below)
Garnish: shredded Cheddar cheese, crumbled cooked bacon

In a 3 1/2 quart glass bowl, layer lettuce, tomatoes, bell pepper, peas, radishes, and cucumber. Top with dressing, spreading to edges to seal. Cover, and refrigerate for 4 hours to overnight. Garnish with cheese and bacon, if desired.

SEVEN LAYER SALAD & DRESSING

Ingredients:

2 cups mayonnaise
1/4 cup chopped fresh chives
1/4 cup chopped fresh dill
4 teaspoons Dijon mustard
2 teaspoons onion powder
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

In a small bowl, combine mayonnaise, chives, dill, Dijon, onion powder, and pepper, stirring well.

INDIAN SPRINGS SCHOOL SENIOR SIGNS TO PLAY DIVISION III SOCCER

Surrounded by his coaches, family, and fellow students, Indian Springs School senior Austin Pack '16 signed a National Letter of Intent to play Division III soccer at Wheaton College in

Wheaton, Ill.

Pack, the captain of Springs' Varsity Boys Soccer

Team, leads the No. 1-ranked team this season with 24 goals in 20 games. An attacking center midfielder who began playing for Springs' as an eighth grader, he was selected MVP of the 2016 Birmingham Metro Tournament in March. He played on the Springs' 2014 state soccer championship team and in 2014-15 was named to the Birmingham All-Metro Team. He has supplemented his high school soccer seasons by playing club soccer for the Vestavia Steamers 98 Black and Olympic Development Program soccer.

Pack's signing with Wheaton College, “a phenomenal educational institution with a long history of soccer success,” celebrates Austin's achievements as well as what is possible when Springs students pursue what they love, whether that is art, math, acting-or soccer, said ISS Boys Head Soccer Coach Rik Tozzi. “Austin's dedication and commitment to excellence really embody the opportunities that Springs provides and what you can achieve when you dedicate yourself to your chosen passion. We could not be prouder of Austin representing the program or the school.”

Rocky Harmon, executive director and coach of the Vestavia Steamers 98 Black, teased Pack, “Austin is the perfect example of the fact that you don't have to be the biggest, you don't have to be the fastest, you don't have to be the best-looking, all you've got to do is put your heart in what you love to do. If you do that, good things will happen.”

Pack said after the signing ceremony that he chose Wheaton because the soccer program is so much like Springs' soccer program. “My time at Indian Springs has been an absolute joy. It's given me the opportunities that I've had. Club soccer is a lot tougher. I've come to enjoy the team element of our high school team. There's so much chemistry between all the players. It's like a family. I just really love that. If I hadn't left Oak Mountain to come here, I would never have experienced that. I just love it.”



OAK MOUNTAIN MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS EXCEL IN THE DUKE UNIVERSITY TALENT IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM

Oak Mountain Middle School is exceptionally pleased to report that seventy-one seventh graders out of a field of 130 Shelby County seventh graders, qualified to participate in the Duke University Talent Identification Program, a unique opportunity that affords eligible seventh graders to take college level ACT tests which help educators and families gain greater insight into their academic abilities. Fifty-five percent of students who were invited for this prestigious opportunity, which took place during the first semester, were from Oak Mountain Middle School.

Students were tested in English, Math, Reading, Science, Critical Reading, and Writing. Just received test results reveal that 45% of the seventy-one winners were OMMS students, more than any other school represented. Of this group, 59% had a score of 21 or greater and earned an invitation to the State ceremony. 66% received Grand Ceremony invitations indicative of a score equal to 27 or above. Only 3% of *all* the participants in the talent search qualify for grand recognition, making this an extraordinary honor for the four successful students, their parents, and our school. The State ceremony will be May 9, 2016, at the University. The Grand Ceremony will follow on May 16, at Duke University in Durham, North Carolina.

OAK MOUNTAIN INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL TEACHER NAMED ELEMENTARY EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR

The Greater Shelby County Chamber of Commerce recognized the very best students and educators from schools across Shelby County at their annual Student and Educator of the Year Program on April 27.

Michelle Dunning, a teacher from Oak Mountain Intermediate, was awarded Elementary Educator of the Year. She received a \$750 cash award for use in her classroom.
