TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

July 5, 2016

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, July 5, 2016. Mayor Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. After the Pledge of Allegiance the Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present except Councilperson Harrington.

The minutes of June 21st were reviewed and accepted as written.

Councilman Robins recognized all the volunteers that worked on the 4th of July celebration. He noted there were too many volunteers to list without inadvertently leaving someone out. He pointed out that the July 4th celebration was a huge success this year with over 200 people attending.

Robins advised he had been in contact with Outdoor Lighting Perspective with regard to maintenance on the outdoor lighting system. Robins stated there is no increase in cost for this service and recommended we continue the service. The council agreed. He advised he has also been in contact with Mr. Gilliland concerning removing flags from poles and storing them in the storage building. This should be handled by next week.

Councilman Trammell presented the eighth step process of annexing 2634 Valleydale Road. He made a motion that the council consider the eighth of the eleven step annexation request Ordinance 2016-015 as presented. Robins seconded and the vote was unanimous. Trammell also presented a document to identify the removal of a mobile home located at 4925 Cahaba Valley Trace. This document should be attached to the declaration made by the town council, August 19, 2014 that identifies manufactured homes as non-conforming uses located in ISV.

Bell-Guercio reported that the items requested by Sain Associates to help cities and counties comply with the ADA were sent. She also asked for more volunteers to **work with the Farmer's Market. A small group of volunteers are giving up their Saturday's and it would be beneficial for the success of the market if we could find additional volunteers so as to not burn them out too quickly.**

Boy Scout Ali Mohammad of Troop 23 was in attendance in order to achieve his Citizenship in the Community and Communications badges.

Bell-Guercio adjourned the meeting at 7:27 p.m.

TALES FROM THE HALL...

I'm Not Leaving Yet...

By the time this article goes to print, Town Council Members will have declared whether they are running for office again or not. Sadly, Mr. Jack Mendel will not be running again. But at the time of the interview, he was an active council member, and thus qualified for the series of articles I am writing about the leadership of Indian Springs. We met for the interview at a local coffee shop, and I didn't have to ask many questions before I was scribbling notes furiously to keep up with **this fascinating individual. I won't reveal his age, but suffice it to say, folks half his age would have a hard time keeping up with Jack!** Jack has served three terms as councilman for Indian Springs Village. **He said he wasn't running for a council seat again, because it shouldn't be all old folks on the Council, and he wanted to make way for younger folks to step up and volunteer their time and talents.**

Jack, and his wife Rita, were born and grew up in Virginia. **After Jack's service in the Army, in Virginia, Maryland and Arizona, and employment with International Paper Company, mainly in the northeast, Jack joined Rust Engineering here in 1984. Jack, Rita, their youngest son David, and their two horses, moved to what is now Indian Springs Village that year. Two older children were already in college. Now, all three of their children (each born in a different area of the country), the children's spouses, and eight grandchildren all live in southern California, but that's another story!**

The Mendel's, and their horses and dogs, absolutely loved it here from the start. Their property was part of the Indian Springs Ranch subdivision, developed by Emmett Cloud specifically set up for recreational horse ownership. In the late 1980's there was an ongoing attempt to convert the Cahaba Valley Road corridor into a commercial strip, despite the objections of most of the residents. As the residents (the Mendel's included) went to meetings and hearings to plead their case, two things happened, one bad and one good. The bad: the pleas in general were ignored by the folks in authority. The good: the residents bonded together to form an incorporated entity in 1990, with control of planning and zoning.

Jack retired from full time employment at the beginning of 2002. He felt gratitude to the talented and hardworking citizens who had made ISV a reality, and he felt an obligation to serve the community. So, Jack began his first term on the Council in October,

2004. He and our former mayor Steve Zerkis began their first terms at the same time. Steve asked Jack to work on developing a simple computer spreadsheet for preparing budgets and tracking financial performance. This evolved into the financial system now in use, which, by the way, always receives high commendations from the auditors

Jack didn't come to local politics with a ready-made background of knowledge. He said he learned as he went along. He is a strong proponent of judicious government spending at all levels of government, particularly at the local level. He thought it important for Council members (and all public servants for that matter) to be aware that the funds collected by a government entity have been removed from private consumption or investment. The Council should be duty bound to appropriate funds, according to a strict and narrow interpretation of the "public purpose doctrine", as mandated by the Alabama Constitution.

We talked about two critical issues that he saw facing the Village in the coming years. First, he stated that ISV needs a much broader level of citizen participation. He paraphrased a statement from President Kennedy: **"Ask not what your Village can do for you, but what you can do for your Village".** Second, he talked about environmental issues, particularly flooding due to storm water runoff, and the need to manage the increasing levels of urbanization, development, and traffic on Cahaba Valley Road. **Jack was a major proponent of the Council's action to change the E-1 minimum lot size, for new subdivisions, from one to three acres in 2011. That action, and this year's Erosion and Sedimentation Control Ordinance, demonstrate the Council's focus on environmental issues. He thinks that this focus must continue, in order to prevent the sacrifice of our community for commercial interests. Ask him about this. He will gladly explain.**

He stated again what a special place this was, and there was such a great need to thoughtfully find the right way to preserve what makes it so special. He said **although he wasn't going to run for a fourth term, he planned to stay involved, because, quote: "I'm not leaving yet". Thank goodness!**

what's cooking

The peaches have been a delicious treat from the ISV Farmer's Market this season. This desert is the perfect way to celebrate summer!

Peach Crisp

For the crumb topping

- 1/2 cup flour
- 1/2 cup old fashioned oats
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- dash of nutmeg
- dash of salt
- 1/3 cup cold unsalted butter, cut into small chunks



For the Peach filling

- 3 1/2 lbs peaches (about 6-8) peeled, cored and sliced about 3/4in thick
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 Tbsp flour
- 2 tsp lemon juice
- 1/2 tsp vanilla
- dash of salt
- dash of cinnamon

Instructions

1. Add the sliced peaches to a medium size bowl. Add 1/4 cup sugar and toss to coat. Allow peaches to sit for about 20 minutes, to allow the sugar to pull some of the juice out of them.
2. Meanwhile, make the crumb topping by combining all ingredients. Cut in the butter with a pastry blender or fork until the mixture resembles small crumbs. Refrigerate the mixture until ready to use.
3. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F.
4. Drain the peaches, reserving the peach juice, and placing the peaches in a large bowl. Measure out 1/4 cup of the peach juice and add it to a small bowl (you can discard the rest, or drink it because it's delicious!). Stir in the flour, lemon juice, vanilla, salt, and cinnamon. Pour mixture over peaches and toss to combine. Pour peaches into a 8x8" or similar size dish. Sprinkle crumb topping evenly over the top. Bake for 30-35 minutes or until golden brown and top is set. Remove from oven and allow to cool for at least 10 minutes before serving. Serve with vanilla ice cream, if desired.

OAK MOUNTAIN TEACHER NAMED FINALIST FOR NATIONAL AWARD

For Jennifer Northrup, the best awards are smiles, bright eyes and the excited babble of high-pitched voices.

However, as one of the five finalists in the state for the Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching, the Hoover resident is receiving national recognition for her work at Oak Mountain Elementary School.



PAEMST is the highest honor bestowed by the U.S. government for K-12 math and science education, according to the PAEMST website. The award recognizes teachers who develop and implement a high-quality instructional program that is informed by content knowledge and enhances student learning.

“I enjoy the students. I enjoy inspiring them,” said Northrup, who has been teaching third grade math and science at Oak Mountain Elementary School for the past three years. **“I have a passion for math and science and I just like passing that love on to them and seeing them getting an idea and seeing their creativity take off.”**

This past summer, Northrup spent three weeks as a trainer for the Alabama Math, Science and Technology Initiative, a program that Mountain Brook Elementary uses. As the lead math and science teacher for third grade at Oak Mountain Elementary, she attends Shelby County school board meetings and collaborates with other Oak Mountain Elementary teachers to determine the most effective teaching method, which often involves more hands-on learning, as opposed to simply reading a textbook.

“When you’re looking at students’ learning, you have to look at the lesson you taught and whether they got it or whether they didn’t get it, then you have to adjust your instruction accordingly on whether it was even just one child who didn’t get it,” said Northrup. **“How are you going to meet all of different students’ needs?”**

Established by Congress in 1983, the program authorizes the president to bestow up to 108 awards a year. Since the program’s inception, more than 4,400 teachers have been recognized for their contributions in the classroom and to their profession.

Northrup expressed appreciation for all the support she has received over the years and hopes to inspire others the same way.

“I always had adults — whether it was administration or colleagues or anybody — that had confidence in me, so their confidence in me drove me to want to do my best and continue going forward,” she said.

In the Shelby County School District, Natalie Landrum, a fourth grade teacher at Helena Intermediate School, was also nominated for PAEMST.

Recipients of the award receive a certificate signed by the President of the United States, a paid trip for two to Washington, D.C. to attend a series of recognition events and professional development opportunities and a \$10,000 award from the National Science Foundation.

“I don’t do what I do for the recognition, clearly, but it is nice to be honored and selected and recognized as a high-quality math teacher,” said Northrup. **“I do what I do for my students and I always want to do what I think is the best practice at the time and give them the best instruction possible.”**


