We had a record number of voter turnout—nearly 300—for our municipal election on Tuesday, August 23rd. I am so proud of our town for getting out to vote. I hope even more of us will go to the polls in November and exercise this privilege and teach our children and grandchildren to cherish this right to have an opinion and a voice in selecting those we put in leadership positions.

We will be welcoming two new members to our Town Council in November—Ed Whatley, Place 4, and Dr. Dale Elliott, Place 5. It is always exciting to have new people with new energy and passion for our Village become involved in our town government.

Jack Mendel chose not to run for another term after serving on the Council for 12 years. We are grateful for his past service and will be counting on him to continue to serve in other capacities.

Bart Trammell, who has served in many capacities for as long as the town has been in existence, will not be returning to the Council, but hopefully will continue to serve his beloved town. We thank Bart for his many contributions.

Some of the things I hope to address or accomplish in the next four years include reviewing and updating our Comprehensive Town Plan, finishing and dedicating our multipurpose building, pursuing the next steps in our “dam safety” issues for not only Oak Mountain State Park dams, but also adding another voice in Montgomery to the efforts of those attempting to see a State Dam Safety Program passed (remembering we are the only state in the union without one!), addressing and completing the requirements of our 4 year federally mandated Storm Water Runoff Plan, and encouraging more interaction with Indian Springs School and new Head Master, Dr. Sharon Howell, and students from Oak Mountain High School and Principal Kristi Sayers, to involve our young people in city government and hear their thoughts while hopefully instilling in them the desire to be active in their community government as adults.

I do want to also mention and commend Leigh and Ed Whatley for organizing donations and then driving a 20 foot truck to Baton Rouge to deliver much needed supplies to flood victims. Our town and others that heard about this effort responded amazingly and with great generosity.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

July 19, 2016

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, July 19, 2016. Mayor Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Boy Scouts Carson Park, Gunnar Schultz, Seth Graham, and Matthew Coby of Troop 533. The Boy Scouts were in attendance in order to earn their Communications Merit Badge. After the Pledge of Allegiance the Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present except Councilperson Harrington.

The minutes of July 5th were reviewed and accepted as written.

Fire Chief Buddy Tyler was in attendance but did not have a special report.

PAZ Chairman Wayne Jones was in attendance and reported that there was no business before the Planning and Zoning committee.

Boy Scouts Gunnar Schultz and Seth Graham presented their proposal for fencing the front Town Hall property. The fencing will be less than 200 feet and should cost no more than \$750.00. Robins made a motion to suspend the rules. Stauss seconded and the roll-call vote was unanimous. Robins made a motion to accept the proposal as presented and not to exceed \$750.00. Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Robins updated the Council on issues concerning the multi-purpose building.

Council Mendel addressed the Farmers Market signs that were removed by Shelby County Environmental Services from along Cahaba Valley Road. He noted that the signs were located on private property, beyond the boundary of the highway right-of-way. The signs were in compliance with the ISV Sign Ordinance. He feels the signs should either be returned or reproduced with the cost paid by the County. Calls will be made concerning this issue. Mendel presented the June financials which were reviewed and discussed. He made a motion they be accepted as presented. Trammell seconded and the vote was unanimous. Mendel also advised that August is the month that the upcoming budget is drafted by he and the Mayor. Any Council input will be appreciated.

Councilman Trammell presented the ninth step in the process of annexing 2634 Valleydale Road. He made a motion that the Council consider the ninth of the ten step annexation request Ordinance 2016-016 as presented. Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Bell-Guercio presented to the Council written statements notifying the Council that only one person, Brenda Bell-Guercio, filed a statement of candidacy for mayor. Only one person, Herb Robins, filed for Council Place #1. Only one person, Kathryn Harrington, filed for Council Place #2. Only one person, Ed Whatley, filed for Council Place #4.

Also presented for consideration was Resolution 07-19-16-01 stating that Brenda Bell-Guercio has been elected mayor without opposition. Stauss made a motion this Resolution be accepted as presented, Mendel seconded and vote was unanimous.

The next resolution presented for consideration was Resolution 07-19-16-02 stating that Herb Robins has been to elected Council Place #1. Mendel made a motion this Resolution be accepted as presented, Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

The next resolution presented for consideration was Resolution 07-19-16-03 stating that Kathryn Harrington has been to elected Council Place # 2. Stauss made a motion this Resolution be accepted as presented, Trammell seconded and the vote was unanimous.

The next resolution presented for consideration was Resolution 07-19-16-04 stating that Ed Whatley has been elected Council Place # 4. Mendel made a motion this Resolution be accepted as presented, Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

The Town Clerk announced that an election will be held to fill the Council Place #3 spot which will be between Robert Burr and incumbent Brian Stauss. Also, Council Place #5 spot which will be between C. Dale Elliott and incumbent Bart Trammell.

The next resolution presented was Resolution #07-19-06-05 stating that Indian Springs Village has called a regular municipal election for August 23, 2016. Under Section 11-46-27 Alabama Code of 1975 provides that the municipal governing body, not less than 15 days before the holding of any municipal election, shall appoint from the qualified electors of the municipality, officers to hold the elections as follows: where voting machines are used, an inspector, chief clerk and a first and second assistant clerk for each voting machine. Robins made a motion the resolution be accepted as presented, Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

The last resolution presented was Resolution #07-19-06-06 establishing the use of electronic vote counting devices, which are one (1) DS200 and one (1) Automark device. Trammell made a motion the resolution be accepted as presented, Robins seconded and vote was unanimous.

Ordinance # 2016-017 was presented to establish procedure for the appointment of additional election officers for absentee ballots in municipalities under 10,000 in population. Robins made a motion to accept ordinance as presented. Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Dale Elliott, Candidate for Place #5, introduced himself to the audience.

Bell-Guercio adjourned the meeting at 8:32 p.m.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

August 2, 2016

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, August 2, 2016. Mayor Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. After the Pledge of Allegiance, the Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present.

The minutes of July 19th were reviewed and accepted as written.

Fire Chief Buddy Tyler reported a total of 148 calls for the month of June, 62 fire related and 86 medical.

Robins reported that a meeting was held July 27th for a progress report from the contractor and architect and to address any questions. Another meeting was held August 2nd with Architect Mark Burns to discuss finishes and kitchen appliances. Another meeting is scheduled in two weeks. Robins also reported that Davis Plumbing moved the lavatory in the Town Hall bathroom in order to be in compliance with ADA per Ed Zwilling our ADA consultant.

Councilman Mendel reported that he has updated the archived budget information and will have a proposed budget for the next council meeting.

Councilperson Harrington reported that she and Bell-Guercio met with Indian Springs School, Head of School Sharon Howell. They toured Indian Springs and Indian Springs School's new facilities. During their meeting they discussed how ISV and ISS could be beneficial to each other.

Councilman Trammell presented the tenth step in the process of annexing 2634 Valleydale Road. He made a motion that the Council consider the tenth of the ten step annexation request Ordinance 2016-018 as presented. Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Bell-Guercio presented to the Council Resolution # 08-02-16-01 Appointing Election Officers for the upcoming election. Harrington made a motion that the resolution be accepted as presented and Mendel seconded. The vote was unanimous.

Bell-Guercio adjourned the meeting at 7:50 p.m.

GARDEN CLUB MEMBERS LEARN OF BLUEBIRD PRESERVATION EFFORTS

On August 25th garden club members and guests gathered at the Town Hall for refreshments, social time and to hear Patsy Scott's informative slide presentation of the efforts of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Findley III to restore the Eastern Bluebird population in Cahaba Valley and Oak Mountain State Park. The work done by the Findleys in the 1970's and 80's to bring back the Eastern Bluebird population is today being carried on by Patsy and group of dedicated volunteers who regularly check, repair, replace or add new bluebird boxes on the Bluebird Trail in Oak Mountain State Park and in Indian Springs. Since bluebirds are cavity dwellers they use holes in trees, old fence posts or nesting boxes. With urban sprawl and changes to metal fence posts many naturally occurring nesting sites have disappeared. With the outlawing of the pesticide DDT and additions of bluebird boxes to our environment the bluebirds have made an amazing comeback and now Indian Springs and Oak Mountain have one of the largest bluebird populations in our state.

Members were encouraged to add a bluebird box to their garden. Bluebird boxes are usually available where birdseed is sold or they can be made following plans and specifications found on the National Bluebird Society's website www.nabluebirdsociety.org. It is important that the entrance hole in the box be 1 and 1/2 inches in diameter and that the box faces in an easterly direction that gives the birds a clear open space to enter the box. Once the fledglings have left the nest, it should be removed and the box cleaned. It is extremely important to protect the nests from predators such as snakes and cats by using predator guards. Supplementing the birds diet with live or dried mealworms is helpful when they are feeding their young or in the cold of winter. Nola Stans was the winner of a drawing for a bluebird box given by the club.

Our next meeting will be at the Town Hall on September 22, at 6:30 with District 7 County Commissioner Lindsey Allison as our speaker. Those interested in our club or in hearing Ms. Allison are invited to attend.

TALES FROM THE HALL...

A Spreadsheet Brain...

Sometimes I do things that are so silly and dumb, you just wonder “what in the world”? I had two strikes of silly and dumb before the interview for this article even started. For all the years I’ve lived in Indian Springs and have been receiving *The Village Voice*, I thought Stauss’ last name was stRauss, with an ‘R’....that’s what my brain always saw whenever I read his name. When I got his contact info, I thought there was a typo in his name. DUH! When we made arrangements for a location for the interview, we decided to meet at a local popular restaurant on a Friday afternoon....silly decision! There was so much noise I could hardly hear myself think and it was even harder to have a conversation much less interview.

Brian arrived in Indian Springs Village in 1994 by way of Milwaukee, WI, with a long stint in Kentucky along the way. He graduated from Western Kentucky University with a major in IT and Mathematics. He said his wife told him he had a spreadsheet brain. He was working in Louisville for a large manufacturing company, when he and his wife Cathy were given the opportunity to relocate to either North Carolina or Alabama. Lucky for Villagers, they both settled on Alabama, and specifically on Indian Springs Village as a place to live, work, and raise their family.

Involvement in ISV government began slowly. Brian said he started out with no experience in municipal management, but just began “by the seat of his pants” by regularly going to Council Meetings strictly as a citizen attendee (back then they were held once a month; it was only after the town’s population exceeded 2,000 that the “town” officially became a city, and was required by law to have council meetings twice a month). Eventually he was approached by the then mayor, Gene Weingarten to run for Town Council in 1990 when Gary Dennis announced he would not be running for another term. One of Brian’s early projects was the creation of a Town website. The website was actually developed by a Boy Scout working on his Eagle Scout project. Once the website was developed, it was turned over to Brian to maintain, which he has done ever since.

When I asked Brian what he saw as the biggest change in his years of working with the Town Council, I expected an answer along the lines of people growth, or traffic along 119. He surprised me with his answer. It was “No Change”. The quizzical look on my face made him smile and explain. No change meant explosive residential growth and commercial

development had not happened to change the natural beauty of the land in a harmful way. He began talking about the 25 Year Comprehensive Plan the city had adopted to help control and manage commercial growth and “no change” meant the Plan was successful. He stated the town was debt-free because council members treated each dollar like it was their own. As a result, the town had been able over each of the last 20+ years to actually set aside budget surpluses, and how many towns can say THAT!

When asking about what he saw as future issues facing the town he emphatically stated management of water runoff was a key issue. Water runoff from Deer Mountain, Oak Mountain, and New Hope Mountain into Bishop Creek was only going to become more problematic in the future. He also wants to see more residents attending Council meetings and volunteering to participate in various functions and committees. It only takes a desire to do something for the city, the right thing, and attending council meetings is a way to start.

In his spare time, Brian is a talented woodworker. He proudly told me about being a member of the Alabama Woodworkers Guild (<http://wp.awwg.info>) and making toys at Christmas for children with long term health needs at Children’s Hospitals in Birmingham, Atlanta, Nashville, Memphis, Mobile and New Orleans. The organization has a 5,000 square foot fully equipped shop in Maylene that can be used by any member of the Guild. He asked me if I had ever sat at the big table in the Town Hall, and I told him yes. He said he had built that table for the town. In fact, he has sweet gum wood drying in his basement and a nearby barn. The wood is from the trees that had recently been cut down on the town hall grounds to make way for the new multipurpose building behind the Pavilion. He plans to make tables and benches from that wood for the multipurpose building.

Now, I think I would agree with his wife Cathy, it takes a spreadsheet brain to keep up with all the activities of this town council member and contributor to the Town Hall.

Slow Cooker Buffalo Chicken Sliders

Ingredients

- 2 lbs. boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 1 cup wing sauce (i.e. Frank's), divided
- ½ onion, chopped finely
- Ranch dressing
- 12 slider buns




Instructions

1. In a slow cooker, add chicken breasts and top with ½ cup wing sauce and onions. Cover and cook on low for 6 – 7 hours or high for 4 – 5 hours.
2. Remove chicken from slow cooker and shred using 2 forks or stand mixer. Reserve ¼ cup of liquid from slow cooker, and discard the rest. Place shredded chicken back into slow cooker bowl, add ¼ cup reserved liquid, and remaining ½ cup wing sauce. Stir to coat chicken.
3. Place about ¼ to 1/3 cup of chicken on each bun. Garnish with additional wing sauce and ranch dressing if desired.
