Message from the Mayor

HOUSEKEEPING

This is about our town's housekeeping, or more specifically our Town Hall's housekeeping and maintenance. The next time you are near the town hall, please drive by and take a look at a few of the improvements that have been made to preserve your Town Hall. As many of you know, the building was originally a house that was built in 1903. It's all wood and in solid condition but, as with all buildings, its needs to be maintained. First of all, if the exterior seems to look brighter, it is. The exterior has been power washed and the wood is being painted. Old, rotten wood in posts and porch ceilings are being replaced and the building is looking fresh. More importantly, it's being protected from deterioration. A new, high quality roof will be installed in the next few weeks. Unfortunately the old roof has reached the end of its useful life and is leaking in a few places with some damage to the front and side porches, and at least one leak in the interior. A modern fire and smoke alarm has been installed and is now in operation. It has direct communication to the North Shelby Fire Department. Take a look at the improvements around the flag pole. New stone work and landscaping has been added to create and highlight a more significant honor area, and stone steps and walkway now lead to the flag pole itself.

Town Council Meeting

April 19, 2005

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met on Tuesday, April 19, 2005 at 7:00 PM at the Indian Springs Village Town Hall.

Town Clerk Shirley Church called the roll and noted the presence of Mayor Steve Zerkis, Council Members Herb Robins, Stewart Dudley, Brenda Guercio and Jack Mendel.

The minutes of March 15, 2005 and April 05, 2005 were presented and unanimously adopted on a motion by Guercio; seconded by Robins. The financial report for March, 2005 was presented to the Council and unanimously adopted on a motion by Mendel; seconded by Guercio.

Robins submitted a proposal from J. Loper & Associates for the construction of the stone steps and enhancement of the surrounding area at the flag pole. Another landscape architect will submit a bid for consideration. Further review and action will be taken at the next meeting.

Robins has received a quote from Cobb Roofing to repair any damage to the roof decking and replace the roof of the Town Hall. It was decided to get two additional quotes from other roofers.

Mendel reported the Town's effort for a Highway 119 clean-up day on April 16 was quite successful and thanked all who participated in this effort.

Wayne Jones, Chairman of Planning & Zoning, made a recommendation that the Council consider holding a public hearing to consider adoption of the codes developed by the International Code Council and the National Fire Protection Association. **Zerkis** then offered a resolution to that effect. **Zerkis** suggested that a public meeting be held in conjunction with the regular meeting held on May 17, 2004. **Zerkis** also directed that the Town Clerk post a notice of this public hearing at the usual locations. A motion to accept this recommendation was made by Robins; seconded by Guercio. The motion was unanimously accepted.

Zerkis reported the fire alarm system had been installed by Fox Alarm.

Zerkis thanked the Garden Club for the beautiful job they have done with flowers on the grounds of the Town Hall.

Zerkis reported there have been coyote sightings reported in the village.

Zerkis reported the State Engineer has postponed his review of the Town's walking track until May 5 at 9:00 a.m.

It was reported that the 45 mph sign that had been damaged in the 3900 block at the North side of Cahaba Valley Road has been repaired.

There was general discussion regarding preparations for the upcoming Fourth of July Celebration which

will be held on Monday, July 4.

There was discussion concerning lighting enhancement at some intersections. It was decided to purchase one lighting fixture to install and determine if it will satisfy the need we have at these intersections.

There being no further business, Mendel made a motion that the meeting be adjourned. Meeting was adjourned.

Town Council Meeting

May 3, 2005

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met on Tuesday, May 3, 2005 at 7:00PM at the Indian Springs Village Town Hall.

Mayor Steve Zerkis took the roll and Council Members present included Brenda Bell Guercio, Jack Mendel and Herb Robins. Also present were Financial Officer Paul Stephens, Assistant Town Clerk Jim Wyatt and Administrative Assistant Bart Trammell.

The minutes of the April 19, 2005 council meeting were presented and unanimously adopted on a motion by Robins, seconded by Mendel.

Zerkis recognized the attendance of former Council Member Tricia Crapet and presented her with a plaque as a small token of the town's appreciation for all of her work for the town. The Indian Springs Village flag given to the town by Tricia was also displayed, and will be flown during our 4th of July celebration.

Robins presented a proposal from J. Loper & Co. to enhance the stone work at the flag pole area and to add stone steps. After discussion, the council voted to accept and approve the proposal on a motion by Guercio, seconded by Mendel. The cost of the work will be \$5,800 and it is to be completed by the 4th of July weekend.

Robins has asked Scott Holladay at the county highway department for his assistance in evaluating the drainage problem near the Murphy property on Spring Garden Street.

Robins is obtaining additional roofing quotes. The roof does appear to have one or more leaks and needs to be replaced. Additional quotes should be in hand by the May 17 council meeting.

Guercio reported on planning for the annual 4th of July celebration. Jim Wyatt offered to obtain a Marine Color Guard for the flag ceremony, and a special team of Iwo Jima reenactors.

Council Member **Brian Stauss** reported by email that the town hall alarm system has been installed and is being attached to our electrical system.

The council discussed a proposal to clean and paint the exterior of the town hall for a cost of \$1,700. The council

voted to accept the proposal on a motion by Robins and seconded by Mendel. Work will begin promptly; however, some of the painting is contingent on replacement of the roof.

Zerkis reminded the council that ethics forms must be submitted to the state by both current council members and those members who served in 2004.

There was discussion about the need for additional visibility at some intersections on highway 119 for night-time turns.

Zerkis asked council members to begin to think about preparing for the town's FY2006 budget, and to also consider items for a three-year capital budget. The new fiscal year starts on October 1, 2005.

There was discussion from residents of Indian Trail about excessive and untimely construction noise.

There being no further business, the council accepted a motion by Mendel that the meeting be adjourned.

In order for you to make a decision on the type of meat you want, we are placing a list of the available selections below. Review the many choices and be ready to place your order when you get to the head of the line. In fact, why don't you clip the list of choices below and have it with you? If you know your selection beforehand, that will speed up movement of the serving line. For you time honored, true traditionalists, hot dogs with kraut and other condiments will also be available.

PLATE CHOICES:

CHICKEN – 1 split breast, 1 thigh and 1 drumstick (thigh and drumstick are attached)

CHICKEN (white meat) - 2 split breasts

CHICKEN (dark meat) - 2 thighs and 2 drumsticks

RIBS – 5 or 6 ribs (one half slab)

CHOPPED PORK–Heaping serving spoonful and more

CHICKEN/RIB COMBO – 1 split breast OR 1 thigh and drumstick AND 3 ribs

CHICKEN/PORK COMBO – 1 split breast OR 1 thigh and drumstick AND spoonful of chopped pork.

Gulf Shore Crab Cakes

Here is my favorite recipe for easy-to-make crab cakes using our fresh Alabama lump crab. They are light on the breading and generous on the crab and delicious.

- A half cup of mayonnaise
- 1 large egg
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 or more dashes of Tabasco or Louisiana Hot Sauce to taste
- 1 teaspoon of parsley chopped
- 2 tablespoons of green onion finely chopped
- 1 pound of fresh lump crab meat
- Approximately twenty Breton brand thin wheat crackers, or Ritz crackers to taste
- Approximately one third cup of canola oil to sauté crab cakes


In a bowl, whisk together mayonnaise, egg, mustard, Worcestershire sauce, Tabasco Hot Sauce, parsley and green onion, and set aside.

Carefully pick over crab meat to remove any bits of shell and cartilage, being careful not to break up lumps of crab, and spread in one layer in a large shallow baking pan. Coarsely crush crackers and sprinkle over crab meat. Pour mayonnaise mixture evenly over crackers and gently fold ingredients together.

Gently pack 8 or so mounds of crab mixture on a tray (crab cakes should be as loose as possible but packed enough to hold their shape).

In a large, heavy skillet, heat approximately one eighth inch of oil to about 375 degrees F. (hot, but not smoking). Working in batches of 3 or 4, transfer crab cakes to the oil and sauté for about 90 to 120 seconds a side, separating them and turning them over at least once until crisp and golden brown, about 3 to 4 minutes total. Transfer crab cakes to paper towels to drain.

Another variation is to use stale French or Sourdough bread. Cut the bread into cubes and leave them out on a large pan for 24 to 48 hours until they are hard. Then crush to make about two cups of crumbs.
