Ron Luster gave the blessing and also provided a surprise for the evening when he displayed an artifact he found from the town's founding: a huge banner from our town's first election that was originally displayed on a balloon. We even conducted a council meeting. Many thanks to Herb Robins and Brenda Bell-Guercio for a wonderful evening.

Every November 11th, Veterans Day, is a special day when we remember and honor the men and women who served and currently serve in the military. We do this because it is honorable to pay tribute to all who fought for our country, for us and for themselves. At 11:00 a.m. on November 11, 1918, hostilities of World War I came to an end. This day and time has been used ever since in the U.S. to honor the people who served in our armed services. There are some 24 million living military veterans. On November 11th, please take time to find and thank a vet.

I was disappointed to hear that a fellow ISV resident recently had their home broken into and several valuable items were taken. Luckily, no one was home but a family's home was violated. Town Council Meeting

September 20, 2011

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. Mayor Zerkis called the meeting to order and the City Clerk called the roll. All council members were present. The Mayor reviewed the agenda.

The September 6 minutes were reviewed by the Council. Mendel made a motion to accept the minutes, seconded by Robins. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Deloach, Barber and Caspers P.C. presented the fiscal year 2010 audit report and gave the City a clean opinion. The deficiencies noted were the lack of segregation of duties and the lack of the GAAP financial statements being prepared internally. These same deficiencies are routinely noted in the audit each year; however, the auditors concur that there is no practical advantage to eliminating them.

Chairman Wayne Jones reported on the recent public hearing of the PAZ. He has posted two notices regarding the recent changes to the zoning ordinance. The first for the technical error for exceeding 90 days that removes the 1-3 acre change and the second for the non-conforming use language. The PAZ approved the non-conforming use language and rejected the 1-3 reversal. Jones summarized other zoning changes. The first reading will be the first council meeting in October. The PAZ is also developing a proposal for sign fees and will also look at adopting the new building code.

Mayor Zerkis gave an update on the fiscal 2012 budget. He revised the budgeted amount for the Sheriff's contract. Mendel noted that on April 6, 2010, the Council approved \$22,000 for paving, but it was not billed until April, 2011. This amount needs to be added to the FY2011 budget. Mendel made a motion to increase the budget for the "5215 Road Maintenance" account by \$22,000 for FY2011, seconded by Dudley. The motion was accepted unanimously. Mendel also noted that the FY2011 budget for the "5113 Miscellaneous" account was increased by \$2,000 on May 3, 2011 for the library reading program grant. After discussion, the Council revised the FY2012 draft budget as follows: "5102 Engineering Fees" to \$15,000; "5108 Legal/Professional Fees" to \$4,000; and the title for the 5117 account was changed from "5217 Oak Mountain Schools Grants" to "5217 Community Grants". Bell-Guercio made a motion to accept the FY2012 budget as amended, seconded by Stauss. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Mendel presented the August financial report. There was a discussion about publishing the monthly financial report on the website. Bell-Guercio made a motion to endorse the August 2011 financial report as presented, seconded by Robins. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Mayor Zerkis presented a memo from Chief O'Connor regarding the fire hydrant project. The project will include the installation of seven new fire hydrants and the repair of two hydrants. The City of Pelham has agreed to charge an impact fee of \$1,500 per hydrant. The estimated cost

is \$29,000 to \$30,000. Bell-Guercio made a motion to suspend the rules, seconded by Robins. The motion was accepted by unanimous roll-call vote. Bell-Guercio made a motion to install seven new hydrants in the City limits and repair two hydrants to improve the health, safety and welfare of residents. There was a discussion about ownership of the hydrants. City Engineer Frasier Christy will contact the water works board to determine ownership. Mayor Zerkis will contact Chief O'Connor to determine who is responsible for repairs and the cost of repairs. The motion is tabled until the next meeting.

Robins presented catering bids from Shane's Rib Shack and Jim and Nick's BBQ for the Founders' Day celebration. Dudley made a motion to accept the bid from Shane's Rib Shack, seconded by Bell-Guercio. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Robins thanked Jones and the PAZ committee for all their hard work on the recent ordinances. Mayor Zerkis thanked Robins and Jones for working with the Alabama League of Municipalities on recent questions.

Stauss reported that he is testing free software for cloud storage of documents. The Kubota is still for sale at a price of \$3,800.

Zerkis reported that two schools in the City won the National Blue Ribbon Award – Our Lady of the Valley and Oak Mountain High School.

Stagg Run subdivision which is now bank-owned, has a real estate company trying to get contracts on the property. There was a discussion about having the bank take care of the current drainage issues.

Mayor Zerkis reported that Mountain Park Drive and Mountain Park Circle are being paved this week. Fox Fire, Old Mill Cove and Old Mill Circle will also be paved.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m.

Town Council Meeting

October 4, 2011

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. Mayor Zerkis called the meeting to order and the City Clerk called the roll. All council members were present except Stewart Dudley. The Mayor reviewed the agenda.

The Council reviewed the September 20 minutes. Bell-Guercio made a motion to accept the minutes, seconded by Mendel. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Mayor Zerkis reported for the PAZ. He read two proposed ordinances that would amend the zoning ordinance. The first contains changes to the non-conforming use language. The second changes the minimum acreage for E-1 zoning from one acre to three acres. Robins made a motion to hold

a public hearing regarding these proposed changes on Tuesday, November 15, 2011, seconded by Mendel. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Mayor Zerkis noted that the motion regarding the installation and repair of fire hydrants was tabled at the last meeting due to the question of ownership of the hydrants. After research, Mayor Zerkis reported that the City of Pelham owns the hydrants unless they are on private property. Both hydrants needing repair are on school property, which is considered private. After a discussion, the Council agreed that the schools should be responsible for the maintenance and repair of these hydrants. Bell-Guercio made a motion to proceed with the installation of seven new fire hydrants for Indian Springs Village for the safety, protection and welfare of residents, seconded by Robins. The motion was accepted unanimously. The estimated cost to ISV for each hydrant is \$2,500 plus a \$1,500 impact fee per hydrant, per discussion at the Council Meeting of 09/20/2011.

Zerkis presented the 2011 audit engagement letter. Mendel made a motion to engage DeLoach, Barber and Caspers for the fiscal 2011 audit, at their proposed fee of \$3,750. The motion was seconded by Bell-Guercio. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Stauss gave an update on the free file-sharing software, Dropbox, he has been testing. He gave a description of the product and discussed the benefits and drawbacks. Stauss made a motion to try Dropbox as the City's file storage and sharing software, seconded by Mendel. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Robins reported that the traffic light at Highway 119 and Caldwell Mill is not cycling correctly. Stone and Sons will check the light to determine the problem. If it is the detector, the cost will be approximately \$150. If the loop has to be replaced, the cost will be approximately \$1,600. Robins made a motion to suspend the rules, seconded by Mendel. The motion was accepted by unanimous roll call vote. Robins made a motion to approve up to \$2,000 for the repair of the traffic light, seconded by Mendel. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Mayor Zerkis reported on animal control. Currently, the City has none in place. The Mayor asked if the City should do something about wild animals, specifically coyotes. There has been a report of a pack in Cahaba Oaks subdivision. A discussion followed. Zerkis met with the County and several towns to discuss sharing the cost of a dedicated animal control officer. No agreement was reached. The Council will revisit the problem if it persists.

Robins reported that he notified Shane's Rib Shack that they were the winning bidder for the Founders' Day Celebration catering. He also reported that Davis Plumbing repaired a water line leak at the new valve box in back of the Town Hall because someone had run over the valve box and broken the line. Davis Plumbing installed PVC bollards around the valve box to prevent

future damage. Robins reported that a large tree limb recently fell on the pavilion and someone dumped a dump truck load of tree limbs and logs at the end of the handicap ramp. Both were removed by J.C. Gilliland. Mr. Gilliland refused payment and would only accept \$50 gas money. Robins proposed that the City pay Gilliland \$300 for the tree removal. There is a \$1,000 reward to anyone providing information that leads to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for dumping the tree debris on Town Hall property.

Mayor Zerkis reported that the paving in the City is complete. Robins noted that McGuire Lane was taken off the list by the County and that he will request it again next year.

Zerkis asked Bell-Guercio to get a birthday cake for Founders' Day.

Zerkis thanked Alison Stigers, the editor of *The Village Voice*, for all the work she puts into the newsletter and also thanked the couriers who deliver 1,200 copies each month.

Mayor Zerkis opened the floor for comments from residents. A resident asked if the City had ever proposed a leash law. Mendel responded that we are covered by the State leash law. Another resident asked what the schedule is for publishing the minutes in *The Village Voice*. Zerkis responded that the minutes aren't official until they are approved and then they are published in *The Village Voice*. Stauss added that the minutes are now posted on the website. Another resident asked if revising the minutes via email prior to approval is legal under the Sunshine Law. Zerkis responded that he confirmed with the Alabama League of Municipalities that it is legal.

Another resident asked for an update to the Mayor's recent comment that he would check on the 90 day action requirement when the PAZ refers something to the Council. He also noted that the same article in *The Village Voice* stated the ordinance was approved. Zerkis responded that the ordinance is approved until it is challenged. This is the purpose for resubmitting the ordinance in question. A discussion followed.

Justin Stoessel, Life Scout, of Troop 71 attended the meeting to earn his Communications badge.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:10 p.m.
