

INDIAN SPRINGS VILLAGE  
TOWN COUNCIL MEETING  
February 5, 2019

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, February 5, 2019. Mayor Brenda Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and led in the Pledge of Allegiance. All councilmembers were present except Councilmember Brian Stauss.

The minutes from January 15, 2019 were reviewed. Councilmember Elliott made a motion to accept the minutes as presented. Councilmember Whatley seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Chief Buddy Tyler, NSCFD reported that renovations are almost complete at Station 2. He offered ISV the use of the new Station 2 meeting room if we should have the need.

Sheriff County Deputy Turner was in attendance and reported there have been a rash of burglaries not in ISV but in surrounding areas. He asked that if anyone notices anything unusual to call 9-1-1 as soon as possible. A white dodge charger may be the mode of transportation for the burglar.

Boy Scout Jack Lyons of troop 71 was recognized. He was in attendance in order to receive a citizenship and communication badge.

Councilmember Robins updated the Council on progress made with regard to the invitation to bid for the Town Hall porch and siding replacement project. He shared the document with Whatley and reported Wayne Jones would be providing addendum for scope of work soon.

Additionally, Robins updated the Council and audience on the Shelby County Planning and Zoning meeting held February 4<sup>th</sup> with regard to the re-zoning request of 63 acres located from Indian Crest down to Hwy. 14 on Caldwell Mill Rd. The property was originally zoned E1 and the commission voted to re-zone to E2 Special District. This will allow 63 homes to be built on the property. There were over 100 people at the meeting to voice their concerns, questions, and opposition to the request. Officials from ISV were in attendance and spoke against the request. However, the request passed by a four to two vote with one abstaining.

Elliott answered the questions brought up at the last Council meeting concerning the new street signs being proposed to ISV by Signarama. The sign post will be a powder coated cast aluminum, the sign will be made of rolled aluminum, and all poles will be breakaway in order to comply with Federal, State and County requirements. Elliott and Robins met with the State and they verified the signs will not be a problem as long as they are placed in the same position as the current signs. Shane Caton of Signarama also reported the manufacturer has been in business 30 years and supports all their products. He also noted the signs have a ten-year warranty on the reflective facing. Elliott made a motion to accept the bid for signs at a \$1,029.65 per sign price installed. An additional \$328.10 will be added as needed for double signs. Robins seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous. A \$15,000 down payment will be issued and the signs

should be installed by March 1. Caton also graciously offered to store old wooden signs until the town develops a plan to dispose of them. Robins thanked Elliott, Joan Downs and Christy DeNard for their work on this project.

Elliott also reported on the success of the Kiwanis project to purchase Chromebooks for the Oak Mountain Schools. Last Friday 100 Chromebooks were delivered to OMHS. Additionally, Southern Companies has agreed to purchase 40, Heart South Cardiovascular has committed to 10 and Elliott has personal pledges for an additional 15. A great start for the worthwhile cause of leveling the playing field for student education.

Elliott also noted that February is Heart Month. The Kiwanis Club will be offering their annual Community CPR Course Thursday February 21, at Oak Mountain High School Media Room. The course will be taught by Dr. Dale Elliott and the paramedics from the North Shelby Fire and Rescue. Everyone is invited.

Elliott also updated the Council on a recent Compact 20/20 event. A Faith Leader Luncheon was held for area pastors. We hope that my working through the churches we will be able to reach more parents and young people. Shelby County Task Force Commander Lt. Clay Hammac was the speaker. Elliott noted that of all the local church ministers in attendance, many had not met each other. The luncheon provided a great networking opportunity for the community to work together in a more comprehensive and expansive way in fighting drug abuse and the effects it has on our community.

Elliott reported that he met with the Medical Advisory Panel recently. Shelby County Coroner Lina Evans has joined the Medical Advisory Panels. Also, in attendance were Representatives April Weaver and Arnold Mooney, along with Lt. Clay Hammac. Currently, Alabama State Representative Arnold Mooney is writing legislation that will allow the Coroner access to the data base and will “require” reporting of deaths due to multiple pain medications from the same physician to the State Board of Medical Examiners for further investigation.

Elliott also noted the Kiwanis Club will be cooking hamburgers and hot dogs at the Annual ISV Easter Egg Hunt in order to raise money for their on-going projects.

Mayor Bell-Guercio adjourned the meeting at 7:50 pm.
