

INDIAN SPRINGS VILLAGE
TOWN COUNCIL MEETING
October 2, 2018

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, October 2, 2018. Chairman Pro Tem Herb Robins called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm and led the Pledge of Allegiance. All Councilmembers were present except Mayor Bell-Guercio.

Minutes from September 18, 2018 were reviewed. Councilmember Elliott made a motion to accept the minutes as presented and Councilmember Stauss seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous and the minutes stand approved.

Chief Tyler reported that the NSCFD passed their budget for 2019 and noted the fire dues were not increased. He reminded everyone that the time will change soon and this would be a good time to change batteries in smoke alarms. He also reported there was a total of 140 calls last month, 62 fire related and 78 medical related.

Robins reported that the porch project is being reviewed.

Councilmember Elliott reported that the first meeting of the Medical Advisory Council, working to help overcome the opioid crisis and in conjunction with Compact 20/20, met last Friday. He noted progress was made and they will meet again in a month. Chief Tyler also informed everyone that Clay Hammrick, of the Shelby County Drug Enforcement Task Force will be holding a class at Jeff State Community College, December 3, 2018 at 10:00 a.m. on the drug trends in Shelby County and everyone is invited.

Elliott also reported that the ISV Kiwanis Club has partnered with the Shelby County Educational Foundation in order to raise money for Chromebooks for Oak Mountain schools. The Alabama Kiwanis Foundation has approved a \$4000 grant for this project. Elliott asked the council to consider a grant for \$5000 payable to the Shelby County Educational Foundation to go toward the purchase of Chromebooks for Oak Mountain schools. A motion to suspend the rules was made by Elliott and seconded by Whatley. The rollcall vote was as follows: Robins – yes, Elliott – yes, McClurkin – yes, Stauss – yes, Whatley – yes. Elliott made a motion that a \$5000 grant be made to Shelby County Educational Foundation to go toward the purchase of Chromebooks for Oak Mountain schools. Whatley seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous.

Whatley presented the August financials. After the review Whatley asked for questions. There were none therefore he made a motion to accept the August financials as presented. Robins seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Robins adjourned the meeting at 7: 34 P.M.
