Message from the Mayor

I know they are not expecting this but I wanted to publicly thank several good neighbors in the Willow Ridge subdivision for the help they given and are continuing to give to a neighbor in need. I won't go into any details, but these good neighbors have taken it upon themselves to clean up garbage, dispose of construction waste on the property, mow the lawn and secure the yard so that this property would not be a problem or hazard to the neighborhood. Thank you for your help!

I attended a very interesting meeting a few days ago at the home of our own Ruth Goodwyn. Ruth gave a presentation on the history of Indian Springs and this Cahaba Valley to the ISV Garden Club and a number of guests. The creation of Indian Springs Village seventeen years ago is a relatively recent action. Much has been done over the past several decades by residents who organized to improve services in the valley and protect their property rights. I have asked Dr. Goodwyn to prepare a written history that will be included in a future issue of *The Village Voice*. I think you will recognize many names of those who have been involved in our community over the years.

As a reminder to everyone, if you will be away from home for a week or more, please try to have someone take care of your lawn and keep it cut. I know there was very little rain in May and June, but with the rains in July, our grass and weeds have exploded. Nothing says “there is no one home” like a very overgrown yard. Let's not encourage any would-be burglars.

Even though we did get some good rain in July, it did little to help our deficit of rainfall. We are still about eighteen inches behind on our normal annual rainfall, and August and September usually are very dry months. I spoke to residents who have wells to water their property and they mentioned that their wells are starting to run dry, so the water table is dropping. Please continue to conserve water.

Big thanks to Sheriff Chris Curry and his deputies for their assistance with some traffic problems in town including speeders on High Gate Hill and Wildwood. I appreciate their professionalism. If any resident would like to meet with and talk to a deputy, please feel free to call Sheriff Curry or one of his staff.

Town Council Meeting

June 5, 2007

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall.

The Town Clerk called the roll and noted the presence of Council Members Mayor Steve Zerkis, Herb Robins, Jack Mendel, Brenda Bell-Guercio and Brian Stauss. Also present was Administrative Assistant Bart Trammell. Councilman Stewart Dudley did not attend the meeting.

The Town Council minutes of May 15 were reviewed and approved as amended on a motion by Stauss, seconded by Mendel. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Robins reported that Adkins Signs is interested in the road sign project.

In preparation for the Fourth of July Celebration, Robins has reserved fans and cambro warmers from Alabama Rentals. He has also ordered chopped pork, beans and cole slaw from Jim and Nick's. Pure Pak Ice was contacted for rental of an ice machine. There are no machines currently available, but they will locate one for us. It was also mentioned that the company has been bought out by Reddy Ice. Moore Coal will deliver an eight cubic yard dumpster the day before the event. The moon walk will also be set up the day before. There was discussion about volunteers for parking and other activities. Stauss will print and send invitations to special guests. He will also print a certificate for the best dessert.

Mendel reported that he spoke to the owners of the property located at Brook Green Lane and Indian Trail where the trees are leaning across the road. The trees have been cut back.

Mendel also reported that he spoke with the auditor who said he should complete the audit this week. He has offered to meet with the council to discuss the findings and recommendations before the report is written. The council discussed this and decided to have the auditor attend the next council meeting.

Mendel contacted the bookkeeper regarding expenses for the town clerk. Her recommendation was that they be broken out the same as the council members.

Bell-Guercio stated she will contact Patricia Crapet about putting the bunting up early for the Fourth of July Celebration. She will confirm with the garden club that they are doing the decorations. The DJ has been confirmed. There was discussion about ordering additional decorations and "give-aways" and it was decided nothing additional will be ordered. There was also discussion about how the contributions for the Fourth will be recorded.

Mayor Zerkis confirmed with Jim Wyatt that the flag raising re-enactment volunteers have been confirmed. There was discussion about asking Ron Luster to say the prayer. If he is not available, someone else will be asked.

Stauss reported that he is picking out a beam for the new conference table.

Robins reported that he recently spoke with Paul Stephens. Mr. Stephens has proposed that he and his grandson-in-law will survey the town for potholes and provide a list to the council. The council can determine which potholes need to be filled and Mr. Stephens and his grandson-in-law will fill them.

Mayor Zerkis gave an update on the abandoned vehicles in the town. Ms. Andrews has told the Mayor she has a mechanic working on the vehicles on her property. Mr. McGuire has been exchanging phone messages with the town attorney.

Trammell reported that the Highway 119 turn lane project is on the bid list and will be let June 29th. There was discussion about having a town meeting to discuss the details.

Mayor Zerkis reported that a 5' by 7' flag will be flown for the Fourth of July Celebration.

The Mayor opened the floor for residents' comments. The Clemens property at Highway 119 and County Road 14 has been rezoned O & I (2). Plans are for five two-story office condominiums. There was a question about the activity at the Longshore property. It was noted that the house is being added to, and a storm shelter is being built.

Mayor Zerkis adjourned the meeting at 7:45p.m.

Town Council Meeting

June 19, 2007

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall.

The Town Clerk called the roll and noted the presence of Council Members Mayor Steve Zerkis, Herb Robins and Jack Mendel. Also present was Administrative Assistant Bart Trammell. Stewart Dudley joined the meeting at 7:15. Councilpersons Brenda Bell-Guercio and Brian Stauss did not attend the meeting.

The Town Council minutes of June 5 were reviewed. Since there was not a quorum at the time of review, there was no approval.

Robins reported that he had received a fax from Richard Adkins of Adkins Signs and Graphics proposing \$180.00/per sign. Robins is also working with Mark Whiten of Whiten Signs and Awnings on a proposal to make the sign posts and hangers, paint the posts and installation of the same.

Mendel reported that the audit is almost complete. The auditor will meet with Mendel prior to presenting the findings and recommendations to the town council.

Mendel reported for Bell-Guercio. She received a telephone call from a resident requesting that the parade vehicles travel at 15 mph. She also stated that Pete Shepard had called and had checked for fire ants and found no activity.

Mayor Zerkis reported on the enforcement of the junk vehicle ordinance and has requested that Russ Allison send another letter to the residents Andrews, McGuire and Brown telling them to remove the vehicles.

The delivery trucks are stilled parked at the rental home on Valleydale Road. A letter will be sent to the owners of the property.

Mayor Zerkis noted that the business license ordinance requires contractors and sub-contractors to have a business license. He suggested requiring a license at the time of acquiring a building permit.

The outdated copies of the Code of Alabama will be donated to the North Shelby Library for the book sale.

There was discussion about the fans rented for the July Fourth Celebration. Similar fans can be purchased at Sam's Wholesale for \$289. The rental fee is \$25 to \$30 per fan, but they have to be picked up. The decision was made to continue to rent the fans.

There was discussion initiated by Mayor Zerkis regarding the value of the Regional Planning Commission dues.

Trammell presented an ordinance to revise the ordinance on funds, specifically how to process blank checks for events such as the Fourth of July Celebration. Robins suspended the rules, seconded by Mendel. Dudley made a motion to accept and Mendel seconded. Mendel made a motion that the town clerk should issue 12 blank checks to Trammell and Robins not to exceed a total dollar amount of \$4,000 for 4th of July celebration expenses. Dudley seconded the motion.

There was discussion about moving the upcoming July 3rd council meeting to July 4th. Dudley made a motion to suspend the rules, seconded by Robins. Mayor Zerkis made a motion to change the meeting scheduled for July 3rd to July 4th. The motion was seconded by Robins.

Mayor Zerkis adjourned the meeting.

ISV Loses a Friend Sheriff James Lewis Jones, Sr.

It is with great sadness that the citizens of Indian Springs Village acknowledge the loss of good friend and supporter, former Shelby County Sheriff James Lewis Jones, Sr. The Village extends deepest heartfelt condolences to the family of Sheriff Jones, who passed away on July 6th at the age of 71 after a valiant two year battle with cancer.

Sheriff Jones was newly elected as Shelby County's chief law enforcement officer about the same time as our town became incorporated. Law enforcement was a key issue on the minds of Indian Springs Village citizens and voters during the early days of our town, and Sheriff Jones was always available to answer questions and most importantly to assure town residents that the Shelby County Sheriff's Department would be more than ready, willing and able to continue its law enforcement in our newly formed town. Sheriff Jones was present at many of the initial meetings and forums that were held during ISV's incorporation and subsequent first elections and his presence, which was highly appreciated, continued throughout his tenure as Sheriff.

For those who don't know or who were not residents of Indian Springs Village during Sheriff Jones' tenure, it is an understatement to say that Sheriff Jones was "one of us." Sheriff Jones was present at many Indian Springs Village town meetings and functions including our Founders' Day celebrations, but especially at the 4th of July parades, which Sheriff Jones led each year of his three terms in office as Shelby County Sheriff, accompanied always by his wife, Debbi and son, Buck. You could count on Sheriff Jones to be wearing his very patriotic flag shirt of red and white stripes, with white stars on the navy blue background. ISV residents enjoyed having the Jones family's presence, and James, Debbi and Buck enjoyed celebrating with us.

Sheriff Jones was true to his word throughout his three terms of office, and Shelby County law enforcement never missed a beat when it came to being needed any time, day or night, anywhere in the Village. After the McClellan house was purchased and renovated, ISV reciprocated with a room in the Town Hall which was designated as a Shelby County Sheriff's Department substation - the only one in the North Shelby area until the establishment of the Heardmont Farms substation.

Sheriff Jones was a good and honorable man, the kind of man who gave of himself unselfishly (selflessly?). At no time was this more evident than at Sheriff Jones funeral. Several preachers from several churches of different religious faiths spoke to the character of a man who spent his life in law enforcement and public service to others. Supreme Court Justice Patricia Smith, previously the longtime Shelby County Juvenile Court Judge and former resident of the Village, gave an uplifting eulogy of a man who was responsible for start-



ing many programs to benefit youth and families in Shelby County. Sheriff Jones, who was a man of great faith, was instrumental in forming the Shelby County Law Enforcement Chaplain's Association and Shelby County's C.A.R.E. Team, which specialized in critical incident stress management for officers and for families.

When the tragedy of September 11th occurred, Sheriff Jones volunteered to go to New York City to assist with recovery efforts at the World Trade Center's ground zero. This act of kindness toward his fellow man did not go unnoticed by New York City's finest, who sent representatives to Shelby County to attend Sheriff Jones funeral and honor his memory.

Sheriff James Lewis Jones, Sr. loved his family, his friends, his church and was a good friend to all who knew him – to fellow law enforcement officers everywhere, to residents of Shelby County and citizens of Indian Springs Village. He will be greatly missed.

Watching Your Garden Grow

In most years, the rain we get in Alabama is more than sufficient for our gardens. But not enough or too much might be harmful and here are a few suggestions. In drought conditions, try to water the same way that rain would naturally fall. You want to try to have slow steady watering for about a half to one hour which will percolate down in the soil and get to the roots. A light sprinkling of the leaves will actually do more harm than good.

It's also very important to add layers of mulch which can be newspapers, leaves, pine straw, hay, etc., to protect the soil and the plants from drying out.

Soaker hoses are nice to distribute water evenly or just use your garden hose and let it dribble on each plant. Filling plastic milk jugs and putting small holes in the bottoms to dribble out slowly is a good way to water.

Too much rain? That can be detrimental also. The folded newspapers and mulch can direct excess water away from the garden and prevent too much from soaking in but the best prevention is good draining soil. Adding compost to the soil early in the season makes for more air pockets in the soil and allows water to drain deeper into the ground. Digging deep to break up a hard layer in the soil will also help drain away excess water. It will all help make those tomatoes taste sweeter.

Pecan Pie Bars

2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/8 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup butter or margarine cut into pieces
1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
1 cup light corn syrup
1/2 cup butter or margarine
4 large eggs lightly beaten
2 1/2 cups finely chopped pecans
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Combine flour, sugar and salt in a large bowl; cut in 3/4 cup butter thoroughly with a pastry blender until mixture resembles very fine crumbs. Press mixture evenly into a greased 13 x 9 inch pan, using a piece of plastic wrap to press crumb firmly in pan. Bake at 350° for 17 to 20 minutes or until lightly browned.

Combine brown sugar, corn syrup and 1/2 cup butter in a saucepan; bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring gently. Remove from heat. Stir one-fourth of hot mixture into beaten eggs; add to remaining hot mixture. Stir in pecans and vanilla. Pour filling over crust. Bake at 350 for 30 - 35 minutes or until set. Cool completely in pan on a wire rack. Cut into bars. Yield: 16 large bars.
