Message from the Mayor *by Steve Zerkis*

First we have some nice warm days, followed by tornados and heavy rains, and the next day we have snow and ice. Does this mean that spring is near? Are we sure? I think I can see daffodils and some blossoms poking out of the snow. Must mean spring is close by, finally.

As our economy continues to weaken, I'd like to remind everyone to be more aware of our surroundings, including our neighborhoods. Please make sure to lock your doors at night, arm your alarm systems while you are at home and away, keep your car doors locked and keep your valuables out of plain view. Communities are seeing some increase in crimes such as burglaries, thefts and other crimes of opportunity. The Sheriff's Department is doing an outstanding job in protecting us and preventing crime. Call 9-1-1 if you see anything suspicious or out of the ordinary. We would all feel safer having a deputy check out anything suspicious. We have a safe and well-protected community and, with everyone's help, it will remain that way.

If you have a storm drainage ditch on your property, please keep it clear of grass clippings, branches, long grass and other debris. Please mow or use your weedwacker on any vegetation growing in the ditches. This will keep the water levels flowing freely so it can make it though your neighborhood without flooding property, either yours or your neighbors.

The economic crisis is also making life painful for businesses in Indian Springs Village. Please patronize them and shop in town. They appreciate your support. The good news is that the vacancy rate of business properties is low and I hope it can stay that way.

Recycling is getting closer. The listing of names and addresses has been sent to Waste Management for processing.

This is a reminder that there will be a special Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) meeting on March 9, 2009 at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. This meeting had previously been scheduled for February 23, 2009 and needed to be cancelled. Our Lady of the Valley Church would like to construct a columbarium on their property. A protest has been filed by a resident and this meeting was called to hear the protest. Please feel free to attend.

Town Council Meeting

February 3, 2009

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall.

The Mayor called the meeting to order and the City Clerk called the roll. Present at the meeting were Mayor Steve Zerkis, Council Members Herb Robins, Jack Mendel, Brenda Bell-Guercio and Brian Stauss. Planning and Zoning Chair Wayne Jones also attended the meeting. Council Member Stewart Dudley arrived at 7:07p.m.

The Council reviewed the minutes of the January 20 meeting. Bell-Guercio made a motion to accept the minutes, seconded by Robins. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Stauss reported for the ZBA. There was an appeal regarding the proposed OLV columbarium filed at the last council meeting. A hearing for that appeal is scheduled for Monday, February 23 at 7:00p.m. Davis Plumbing's variance request may also be on the agenda.

The article Bart Trammell submitted for publication in *The Village Voice* describing his opinion of the proposed OLV columbarium, and the Mayor's email response, was distributed to the Council. The article will not be published at this time since a ZBA hearing is scheduled for this matter.

Jones reported for PAZ. Davis Plumbing has requested rezoning to B-1 to put a daycare in their vacant building. It was previously rezoned as M-1 for the cell tower on their property. The zoning ordinance will be amended to include verbiage from the wireless ordinance. There will be a hearing next month.

Mendel presented the pre-audit financial report and a comparison of expenses versus revenues for fiscal year 2005 through 2007. Expenses have increased, but so have revenues. The City is in good financial shape should a decision be made to purchase the 2370 Cahaba Valley Road property. Mendel made a motion to submit the pre-audit financial report to the audit firm, seconded by Stauss. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Robins reported that Jimmy Rhodes replaced the damaged signpost discussed at the last meeting. The cost is \$100. Robins received a letter from Marlin Bennetch of Outdoor Lighting Perspectives regarding renewal of the annual maintenance plan. The cost will remain the same as previous years, at \$18 per light. Robins made a motion to accept the proposal, seconded by Bell-Guercio. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Robins received an update on the 119 turn lane project. The project has been delayed due to rain and low nighttime temperatures. The estimated completion date is now May 2009. The State has charged the contractor days against the 120 days contracted. They have also told the contractor to watch his erosion control. Robins gave an update on the culverts that will be replaced.

Mendel spoke with an Indian Trail resident who reported problems with coyotes howling through the night. There were three coyotes, but one was reportedly killed on Highway 119 in front of Neil's Pharmacy.

Mendel reported that residents have stated that Bishop Creek levels, after heavy rainfall, are now increasing more rapidly in the Indian Trail – Brook Green Lane area. The unauthorized fill of the flood plain on the 2370 Cahaba Valley Road property, and/or the Highway 119 widening project, are possible factors to consider. Dudley noted that the contractor, who made the unauthorized fill, was supposed to remediate, but has not. Dudley further stated that this remediation should be considered a prerequisite for exercising the City's option of purchasing the 2370 Cahaba Valley Road property. Mayor Zerkis will contact the City Engineer to have him notify the contractor. There was a discussion about drainage plans included in the turn lane project, potential subdivision development and existing drainage problems.

Mayor Zerkis reported on the initial asbestos study on the 2370 Cahaba Valley Road property. Two bids for removal have been submitted (if the house is purchased). Both bids are under \$5,000. Zerkis has asked the County for a cost to demolish the house. He also reported that water in the lakebed is delaying an inspection for sinkholes.

AT&T is marketing its new U-verse TV, high-speed internet and telephone service products door-to-door. There was a brief discussion about availability and cost.

With the installation of a fence on an adjoining neighbor's property, the Town Hall has lost parking spaces on the right hand side of the building. The handicap spaces are still accessible. We need a solution to keep people from driving across the septic tank area. The parking area on the left side of the building will need to be improved with fencing, rocks or bollards around the flagstones by the flagpole. There was a discussion about making the handicap parking easier to access.

Mayor Zerkis attended a presentation by Shelby County Sheriff Chris Curry. Chelsea, Westover and Indian Springs are currently using contract deputy services. Sheriff Curry proposed that cities with police departments use contract deputy services to save money.

Two supernumeraries have been appointed to the ZBA: Art Johnson and John Strozier.

There was a discussion about revising the website to separate PAZ and ZBA.

The recycling project is in process. Rasco is currently completing a spreadsheet of interested residents to submit to Waste Management.

Mayor Zerkis opened the floor for comments from residents. Trammell commented that it would be beneficial to publish his article regarding the proposed OLV columbarium in *The Village Voice* since there

have not been many attendees at the last two meetings. Mayor Zerkis responded that the hearing is scheduled for February 23 and that the January 20 meeting minutes and the hearing notice will both be published in this month's *The Village Voice*, providing comments that are fair and balanced. Mayor Zerkis will also add information about the upcoming hearing in his "Letter from the Mayor" article and invite the public to attend. Bell-Guercio suggested publishing a revised article from Trammell with a response from the City. There was additional discussion about the upcoming hearing, during which Mendel reiterated that the Council does not make the decision, the ZBA does. Jones reiterated that the process prescribed by ordinance was followed and Dudley stated that there is no issue before the Council.

The Mayor adjourned the meeting at 8:25 p.m.

Interesting Mix of Events at Garden Club Meeting

Bob Pate of the Birmingham chapter of the National Audubon Society was the featured speaker on the program of the Indian Springs Garden Club, which met Thursday evening, February 26, at the Town Hall. His topic was birds and, according to club president Lynn Hendricks, he showed "absolutely gorgeous" slides mostly of local birds, with some from other areas, such as Mexico, thrown in. What was most intriguing was that he knew exactly the bird "calls" of each bird, Lynn said, and demonstrated when each slide came up.

The Audubon Society is also interested in bird and animal habitats and Mr. Pate had beautiful slides of wildflowers to show. Mr. Pate, a retired lawyer, is an excellent photographer, Lynn said.

While Mr. Pate was setting up his computer, "preserved" camellias were passed around for all to admire. They were the work of Villager Evelyn Harper who learned the method of dipping camellia blossoms in hot paraffin and then in ice water. She had used pink camellias which she said, after experimentation, worked best. She had been to the recent camellia show at the Birmingham Botanical Gardens where this technique had been demonstrated. Flowers preserved in this way are beautiful favors at individual table settings, among other uses.

In keeping with the program topic, Jennie Pittman distributed bags of about a cupful of birdseed to members. Attached to each was a handwritten poem, "Friends of Time," composed by Jennie:

"Come little birdie
On the wing
Let your songs ring out
For the first of spring;
Welcome friends, back home again
To your beloved Indian Springs!"

It had been made known that refreshments would be served at this meeting, open to the public, but when members entered the Town Hall, they were greeted by a feast—a surprise birthday party for President Lynn Hendricks! Held after the program, the party had been initiated by Jennie Pittman and Liz Eich.

Poems by Indian Springs School (ISS) freshmen Emily Cutler (right) of Hoover and Leah Fox (left) of Birmingham have been chosen for publication in *A Celebration of Poets*, an anthology of award-winning poetry by Creative Communication, a Logan, Utah-based organization that sponsors poetry and essay contests and offers educational resources for language arts teachers.



Fox's poem was titled, "China Doll," and Cutler's poem was titled, "Pre-planned Goodbye." Fox and Cutler are co-founders of the ISS Writing Club, which encourages writing among students.

Cutler's article "Voice Box: Lowering the Voting Age" from the September/October 2006 issue of *New Moon: The Magazine for Girls and Their Dreams* was also reprinted in *Keystone Level E*, an English as a second language textbook.

Indian Springs School sophomore Ji Min Yang of Seoul, Korea, won first place in the string division of the prestigious Lois Pickard Music Scholarship Competition on January 24. She played the first movement of Concerto No. 5 by W.A. Mozart.



Sponsored by the Symphony Volunteer Council of the Alabama Symphonic Association, Inc., the Lois Pickard Music Scholarship Competition is open to serious and gifted young musicians ages 12-senior high school. Students compete in one of the following areas - strings, brass, winds, percussion and piano - and entrants come from Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Mississippi and Tennessee.

Yang will perform with other winners at the Lois Pickard Award Luncheon on February 12, when she will officially receive her \$1,500 cash award for winning the string division.

Yang currently studies violin with Concertmaster Daniel Szasz of the Alabama Symphony Orchestra.

Indian Springs School (ISS) has received the 2009 Siemens Award for Advanced Placement (AP), which honors schools that lead their state in AP participation and performance in math and science. It is the only high school in Alabama - and one of just 50 in the nation - to receive the 2009 award, and the first Alabama independent school to ever earn the distinction.

The award winners were announced yesterday by the Siemens Foundation and the College Board, who partner to present the awards. Names of all award recipients were featured in *USA Today* on Monday, February 23. The College Board is a not-for-profit association of more than 5,600 schools, colleges, universities and other educational

organizations that administers the AP Program as well as the SAT and PSAT/NMSQT tests. The Siemens Foundation offers more than \$7 million annually in support of educational initiatives in the areas of science, technology, engineering and math in the United States.

As an award recipient, Indian Springs will receive a \$1,000 grant from the Siemens Foundation to support math and science education.

"In a pool of extremely strong applicants from your state, your school's commitment to providing your students opportunities to explore the AP Program and your staff's dedication to student success were evident," said Diane Tsukamaki, director of the College Board's National Recognition and Scholarship Programs, in a letter to Indian Springs Director Gareth Vaughan congratulating the school on the award. "We believe high schools like yours represent the best of American education."

"I am very proud of our faculty and students for their achievement in AP math and science," Vaughan says. "But if anything, I am even more proud of how our AP involvement helps stimulate the development of other exciting educational experiences." Examples include student participation in the Proteins in Space program with Dr. Larry DeLucas at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, and sustainable development courses built around the Fertile Minds Learning Garden, the school's organic garden and outdoor learning laboratory, Vaughan adds.

Indian Springs School offers AP courses in Biology, Calculus BC, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Physics B, Physics C: Electricity and Magnetism, Physics C: Mechanics, and Statistics. In 2008, Springs' students garnered many individual AP honors:

- One student earned the distinction of AP National Scholar - given to those who receive an average grade of at least 4 on all AP Exams taken, and grades of 4 or higher on eight or more of these exams
- 12 Springs' students were named AP Scholar with Distinction - given to those who receive an average grade of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and grades of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams
- 10 Springs' students were named AP Scholar with Honor - given to those who receive an average grade of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and grades of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams
- 23 Springs' students were named AP Scholar - given to those who receive grades of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams.
