Message from the Mayor *by Steve Zerkis*

“WE HAVE RECYCLING!”

I received word from John Beasley of Waste Management Inc. that they will begin collecting our recyclables in Indian Springs Village this month. They are supposed to be in the process of distributing wheeled recycle carts within a few days to each resident who signed up for the program either through WMI or the town. Hopefully each of us who signed up will get our cart by the time you read this.

The recycle carts will have literature attached describing how the program works for us. I understand that we can toss in paper, cardboard, plastic bottles and containers, aluminum and tin cans. Glass is the one item they do not want to take. Of course, each bottle or container should be empty and rinsed out. There is no need for us to sort any of these items; they can be mixed together in the cart. WMI will sort out all recyclables at a central processing point.

The pickup will be twice a month at the curb and they will tell us the schedule. I believe they will make their first run on August 5th.

If your cart has not been delivered when you read this, please contact Waste Management at 1-800-333-7724 or 205-841-2740 to verify that they have you signed up for this service. We have been working with Waste Management for over a year to get this service started and I do know that WMI lost some of the initial names. So to make sure you are listed, call them. They also pointed out that those of you who don't use WMI for garbage pickup will need to open an account with them for both garbage and recycling.

I'm delighted that this program is finally getting underway. This is a positive step in improving our environment.

An update on Highway 119: the state has hired a contractor to maintain the storm water drainage along the right of way. You may have seen their crews working at several points, including the McGuire Road area. This contractor is not the one who will be doing the road work. We should know the name of the road contractor in a few days and will work to get a schedule.

We have a few more weeks of summer and I hope everyone is enjoying the weather and our beautiful state.

Town Council Meeting

July 7, 2009

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. The Mayor called the meeting to order and the City Clerk called the roll. All council members were present except Stewart Dudley. Wayne Jones, PAZ Chairman, was also present.

The Mayor read the meeting agenda. The Council then reviewed the minutes of the June 18, 2009 meeting. Bell-Guercio made a motion to accept the minutes, seconded by Robins. The motion was accepted unanimously.

Robins reported that Gary Ray, ALDOT, had a meeting/teleconference with the bonding company for the Highway 119 turn lane project and potential contractors. Bids are to be submitted by July 17 and the contract will be awarded on July 27.

Robins also gave an update on the Charter subcontractor attempting to move cable lines from the utility right of way to residents' front yards in the Homestead subdivision. Thanks to Steve and Reggie Holloway (Shelby County) who intervened. They both spoke with Skip James of Charter. The lines will be replaced in the utility right of way.

Robins received a bid to update the sprinkler system coverage from Larry Rogers/Advanced Irrigation for \$480. There was discussion about obtaining a schematic drawing of the system to ensure that it is not in the proposed parking area. Mendel moved to accept the proposal from Advanced Irrigation, seconded by Robins. The proposal was accepted unanimously.

The damaged sign at North Shelby Fire District Station 2 has been replaced. The damaged street sign in Cahaba Oaks will be replaced.

Bell-Guercio was contacted about an annexation request on 3 ¾ wooded acres located across from Oak Mountain High School. The owner is interested in having the property rezoned for commercial. There was a discussion about current zoning.

Mayor Zerkis stated that the Fourth of July Celebration was great and thanked everyone for their hard work. There was discussion about providing a script to the deejay for the re-enactment. There were more parade participants this year. Some residents told him this was the best celebration yet.

Zerkis reported that Waste Management has ordered the recycling carts and will be contacting residents in the next couple of weeks to arrange delivery.

Zerkis reported that Randy Cole, Shelby County Engineer, came with his engineers and visited the site to give an approach and estimate on the Town Hall drainage project. The work is planned to begin in July.

Shelby County will be participating in the State tax holiday August 7 through 9.

Mayor Zerkis will be attending a 2010 Census committee meeting.

Zerkis received an email from the renters of the house located at 2630 Valleydale Road. They plan to resume home schooling at the house in August. Russ will send a letter stating that they are in violation of ISV zoning.

ADEM is conducting a Storm Water Compliance joint audit with the federal and state EPA.

Jones gave an update on the Cahaba Valley Road property. Three issues still exist: 1. fill dirt needs to be moved from flood plain; 2. grading to be performed in front of culverts; and 3. LOMAR map to be updated. He suggests making these contingencies upon purchase in the contract. Bell-Guercio motioned to cancel the existing contract at this time, seconded by Mendel. The motion was accepted unanimously. Robins thanked Jones for the hours of work he has put towards this contract. A resident suggested looking at other properties in ISV for green space and a discussion followed.

Mendel stated Jones has suggested declaring the properties adjacent to Bishop Creek protected and a discussion followed.

Mayor Zerkis opened the floor for comments from residents. Bart Trammell asked to be on the agenda for the next meeting to address the Council. Another resident thanked the Council for their hard work. The resident who had reported a car being towed by the Sheriff's Deputy at the last meeting asked for an update on his situation. Mayor Zerkis recapped the events and reported that he spoke with Capt. Corbell who stated the Deputy has been more than reasonable. A discussion followed. Another resident asked whom they could contact to get a stop sign on Miller Circle. Robins suggested Randy Cole with Shelby County.

Mayor Zerkis adjourned the meeting at 8:23 p.m.

Recycling Bins at Heardmont

There are two large recycling bins located by the Oak Mountain High School stadium in Heardmont Park that residents are encouraged to use. Cardboard, newspapers, tin cans and many plastics are accepted. They do not accept glass at this time. Shelby County recently posted a sign on the fence by the entrance to the recycling area, warning that anyone leaving materials on the ground



around the bins rather than in the bins will be in violation of Act No. 99-417 of the Legislature of Alabama and subject to a \$250 fine. The sign also indicates that the area is under surveillance via a camera on the light pole by the entrance.

It is very frustrating to take a load of recyclables to the bins, only to find them overflowing and having to bring your things back another day. I spoke to Shelby County Commissioner Lindsay Allison about this, and she said that the bins are emptied twice a month. If you consistently find the bins overflowing, please contact me (205-987-9997) and I will work with Lindsay to arrange more frequent service from the contractor.

An alternative to hauling your recyclables to Heardmont is to sign up for curbside recycling, which Waste Management will begin offering in ISV with a first pick-up on August 5, 2009. There is a monthly fee of \$5.06. To order the service, you can call Waste Management at 1-800-333-7724 or 205-841-2740.

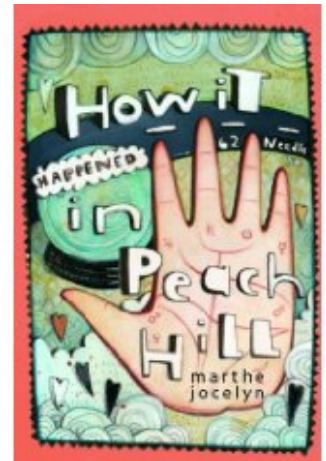
