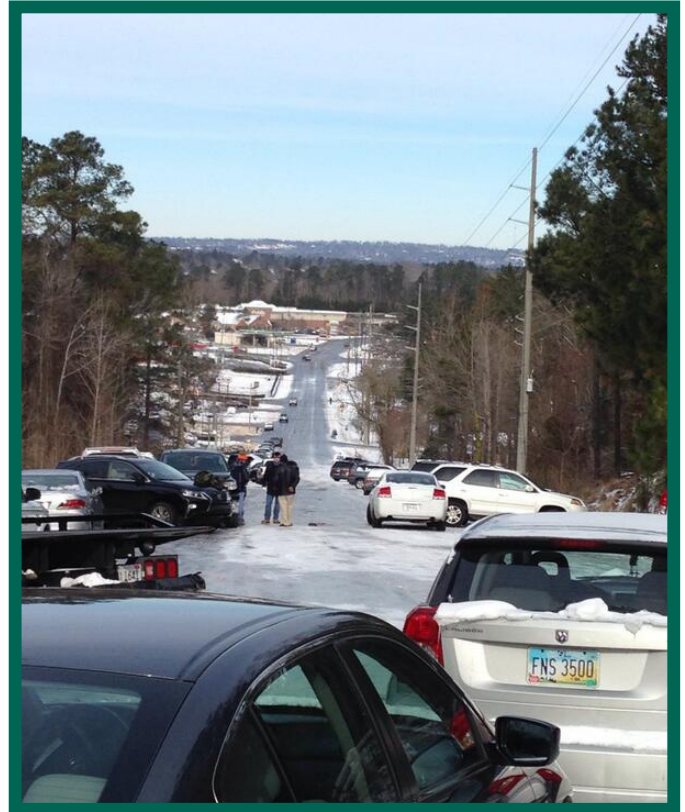

# Town Council Meeting

December 17, 2013

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at the Town Hall on Tuesday, December 17, 2013. The Mayor called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. The Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present. The council meeting minutes of December 3rd were reviewed and accepted by the Council as written.

PAZ Chairman Wayne Jones reviewed the request to amend the Indian Springs Village Alabama Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance. Councilwoman Harrington made a motion to include changes to Article 4 Section B and Section D to change the building requirement for residential construction from a (BFE) Base Flood Elevation plus 3 feet to 1 foot above base flood elevation. Councilman Jack Mendel seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous.

Councilman Herb Robins expressed his and the Council's thanks to the residents for their generosity and contributions to the Children's Fund. Gifts were provided for twenty-four children from ten families. (We were made aware of an additional child with needs after the council meeting and those needs were met).

Councilman Stauss led a short discussion concerning information needed for the web-site. Dead-line for submission is Friday, December 20th.

The Mayor adjourned the meeting at 7:30 p.m. and everyone participated in the Christmas celebration.

# Town Council Meeting

January 7, 2014

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at the Town Hall on Tuesday, January 7, 2014. The Mayor called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. In the absence of the City Clerk, Councilman Robins called the roll and all council members were present except councilperson Kathryn Harrington.

The council meeting minutes of December 7th were reviewed and Councilman Stauss motioned to accept the minutes as amended, seconded by Councilman Trammell. The vote was unanimous.

Fire Chief Tyler reported that in December, the department responded to 34 fire related calls and 99 medical calls. The total calls for 2013 were 1627 (510 fires; 1117 medical).

Councilman Mendel reviewed the November financial report and motioned to endorse the report, seconded by Trammell. The vote was unanimous.

Robins reported street signs at the intersection of New Hope Mountain Road and Paleo Place have been broken off the post and discarded behind a house on New Hope Mountain Road. This occurred around Christmas. The council agreed that a reward would be offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone responsible. New signs have been ordered.

Stauss reported problems with e-mail blasts being "bounced back". He is researching upgrading the city's e-mail service. Final preparations are being done to the new ISV website and a training course will be given to council personnel who will be responsible for administering the site.

Trammell requested that the Council discuss building permit requirements as well as website design at a council work session scheduled for Monday, January 13th at 6:30 p.m.

Mayor Bell-Guercio gave an update on the Oak Mountain State Park dams. The repair work requested by the council has been completed according to Shelby County Manager Alex Dudchock. Bell-Guercio also reported that the council has the opportunity to purchase a plaque from the Alabama Register of Landmarks and Heritage to commemorate the Town Hall's listing on the register.

The franchise agreement between ISV and Charter Cable was discussed and the Council will review the current agreement.

The Mayor adjourned the meeting at 7:58 p.m.

# Indian Springs Village – Financial Summary 2013-2014

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In a March 2013 *The Village Voice* article, we discussed our finances, particularly the annual operating budgets for revenue and expenses and the year-by-year trending of financial performance. Our intent now is to summarize the financial events over the past year, and to update the charts shown in that article. Note that all amounts cited and all charts shown in this summary exclude the ISV Children's Fund.

## **1. Revenue and Operating Expense Budgets**

The 2014 fiscal year (FY2014) began on October 1, 2013. The revenue and operating expense budgets were developed during August, and were approved by the Council at the council meeting of 9/3/2013.

The revenues were budgeted to total \$285,900, slightly larger than the \$279,700 budget for FY2013. As it turned out later in the year, the actual cash basis revenues collected by ISV exceeded the FY2013 budget by 25%. Section 3 of this summary includes a discussion of windfall revenues responsible for this favorable event. The sources of the FY2014 revenue stream are shown by the pie chart in Figure 1, at the end of this document.

The operating expenses were budgeted to total \$187,130, coincidentally almost the same as last year. Actual cash basis operating expenses last year were favorable by 1%, relative to the budget.

A significant change in the FY2014 operating expenses budget, compared to FY2013, resulted from two changes. First of all, we increased our Education and Community Grants by 25% in response to Shelby County's effort to increase school security, using additional personnel from the Sheriff's office. Second, the use of "blast" email of web links, in place of courier circulation of *The Village Voice*, will significantly reduce our printing costs.

The distribution of the FY2014 operating expenses budget is shown by the pie chart in Figure 2, at the end of this document.

## **2. Annual Municipal Audit**

As required by State law, an audit of the books and accounts of ISV was performed by DeLoach, Barber & Caspers, P.C., an independent public accountant. The period covered by the audit was the fiscal year ending 9/30/2012 (FY2012). The auditor's written report was presented to the Mayor and Council during the council meeting of 10/1/2013, by John DeLoach, a principal in the accounting firm. We received a "clean" audit, as well as compliments on our financial condition.

As part of the audit, the ISV FY2012 accounts were adjusted to comply with the accrual standards set by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). All amounts cited and charts shown in this financial summary are adjusted to this standard, with the exception of FY2013, which will be audited later this calendar year.

## **3. Closing of FY2013 Accounts**

The closing of the FY2013 books was reviewed by the Council, concurrently with the review of the September financial statements at the council meeting of 11/5/2013. The following highlights were included in the minutes:

- Annual cash basis revenue, across all funds, exceeded the \$279,700 budget by 25%.
- Annual cash basis expenses, across all funds, were 1% less than the \$187,100 budget.
- Annual cash basis net income, across all funds, amounted to a surplus of \$163,400 vs. a budgeted surplus of \$92,600.

## Indian Springs Village – Financial Summary 2013-2014

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- The Fire Hydrants Project was completed in September with the installation of 7 new hydrants along Cahaba Valley Road at a total installed cost of \$41,960. This amount was 26% below the per hydrant budget approved by the Council on 9/4/2012.

The Council expressed its appreciation to Pelham Mayor Gary Waters, North Shelby Fire Chief “Buddy” Tyler, the Pelham Water Works, and Byrd Contractors for their cooperation in getting this project completed with such great efficiency.

The major contributor to the favorable revenue variance was the receipt of \$55,590 from the Alabama Trust Fund, relative to a budgeted amount of \$19,000. Other contributions to the favorable variance came from building permits, business licenses, and cell tower inspection fees. Note that all of the above in this section is stated as “unaudited”.

### **4. Updated Financial Performance Trends**

Please refer to Figure 3 at the end of this document. Significant financial trends are summarized with three bar charts, covering the last nine years. The upper bar chart shows a comparison of actual operating revenue and expenses. Notice that revenue has been increasing over the past 4 years and we continue to run a significant surplus. The accumulation of assets from this surplus is shown in the middle bar chart. Most of the surplus has been kept in current assets (the lower bar section each year). This includes cash and bank CD’s. The upper bar section is the book value of our net fixed (capital) assets. Our total net assets, current and fixed, were zero on November 15, 1990, when ISV was incorporated. By September 30, 2004, total net assets had grown to \$892,604. As of September 30, 2013, pending audit, we are up to \$2,176,000.

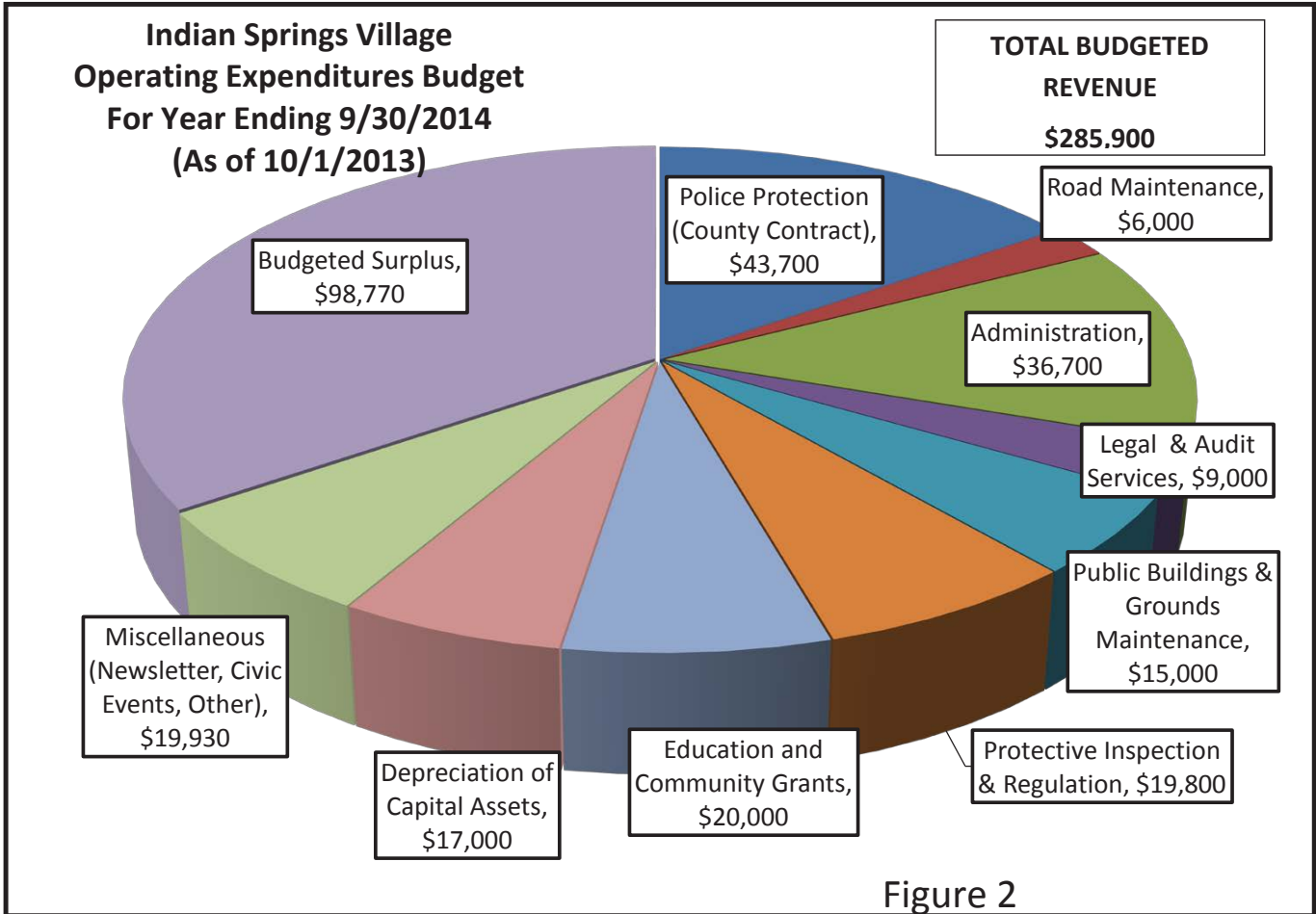
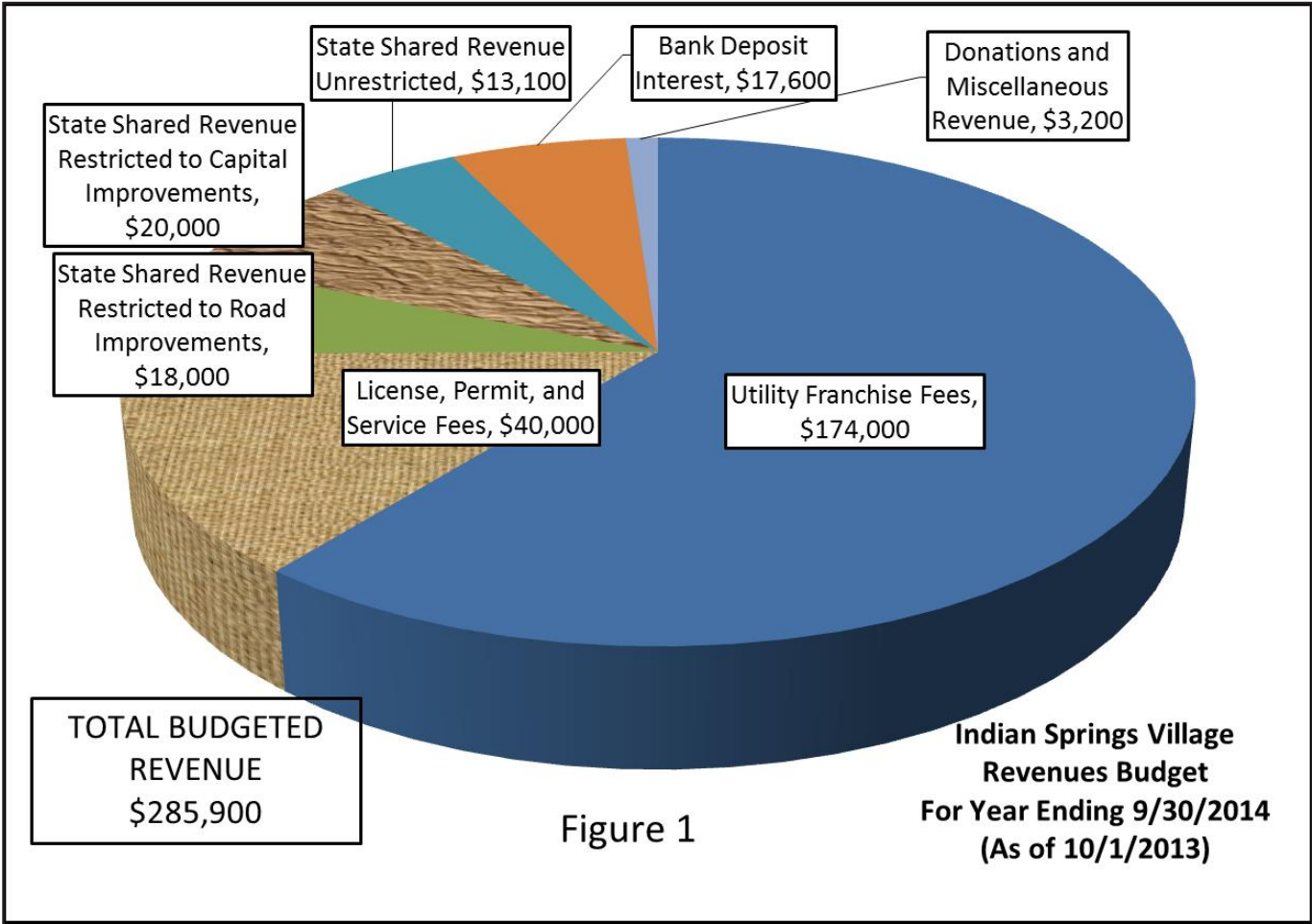
The lower bar chart shows the trend of our investment in capital projects (fixed assets). These can be approved by the Council at any point in the year. The taller bar each year is the accumulated investment at the end of the year. The shorter bar is the net of investment less depreciation, the same as the book value of net fixed assets from the middle bar chart, but shown on a different scale. On September 30, 2004, accumulated investment in fixed assets was \$232,085. As of September 30, 2013, we are up to \$348,830 (pending audit). For FY2013, this included the addition of the 7 new fire hydrants on Cahaba Valley Road, as well as two Eagle Scout grounds improvement projects.

### **5. Council Review of Monthly Financial Statements**

Financial statements are distributed to the Mayor and Council each month detailing our assets, and our revenue and expense transactions. These statements are then reviewed at a council meeting. This is typically on the agenda for second meeting of the month, wherein the statement for the previous month is reviewed. These are public meetings and these are public funds that we are receiving and spending. Your attendance at meetings and comments on our financial priorities are welcomed at any time.

## Indian Springs Village -- Financial Performance Trends

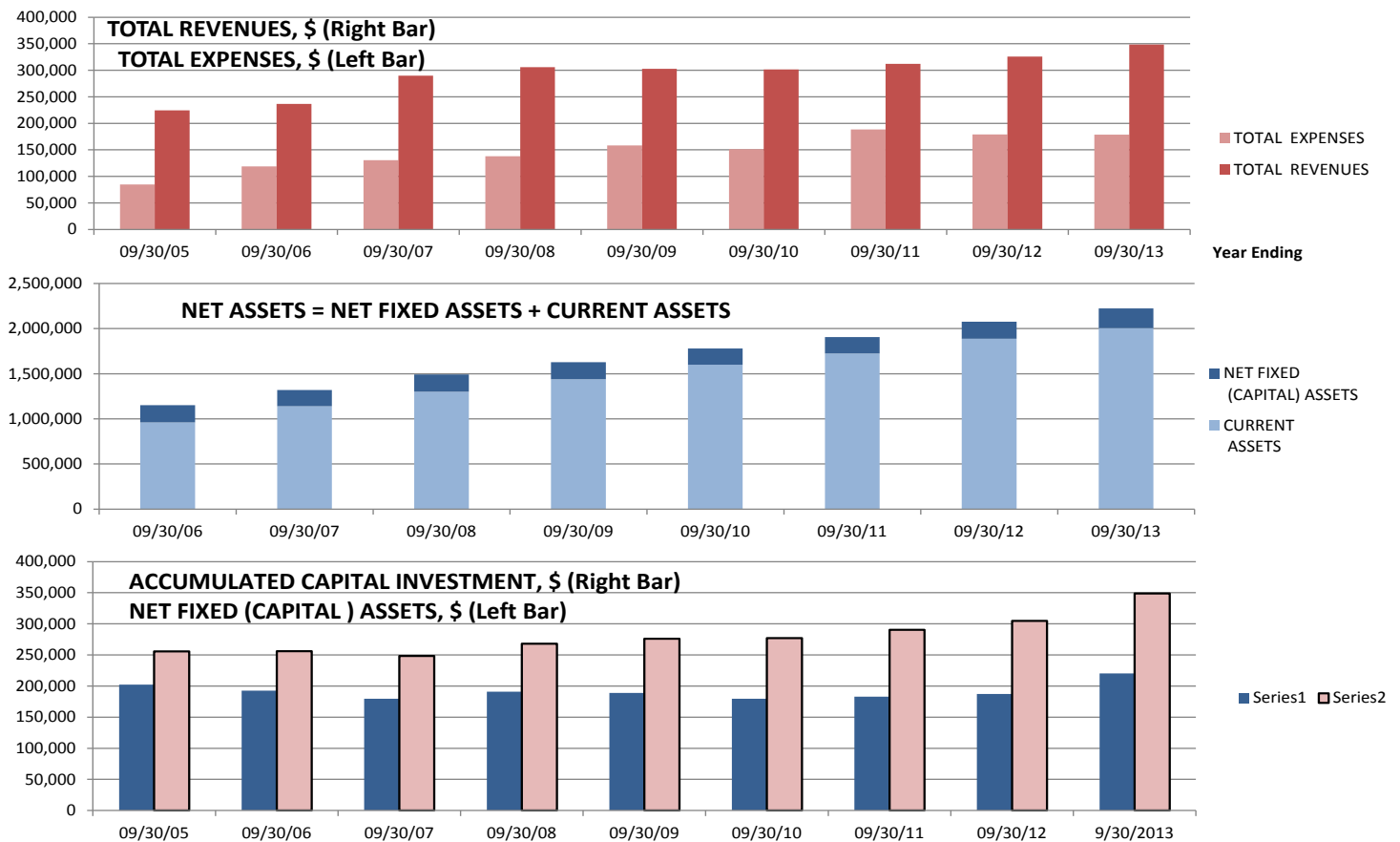
