Town Council Meeting

March 18, 2014

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at the Town Hall on Tuesday, March 18, 2014. The Mayor called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. The Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present.

The council meeting minutes of March 4, 2014 were reviewed and approved as written.

Councilman Mendel presented the February financials. He reported our financial standing is good, and FY2014 business license revenue set a new record high. Mendel made a motion that the financials be accepted. Councilperson Harrington seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous.

Chairman Wayne Jones reported to the council that the PAZ meeting held March 11, 2014 was successful and the revised Zoning Ordinance was completed except for grammatical editing. He will post a Notice of Public Meeting and the ordinance will be presented to the council for a first reading at the next Town Council Meeting following PAZ approval.

Councilman Robins reported the fans in the pavilion have been replaced and additional electrical servicing performed and is ready for the summer season.

Robins also brought to the attention of the council a letter from Amy Easton suggesting ideas that might help in keeping our facility clean, pest-free, and ready for use each time it is reserved. A discussion ensued and Councilman Stauss made a motion that a \$100 refundable fee be required for use of the Town Hall. A refund is subject to the condition of Town Hall after an event. If any cleanup or maintenance is needed, the deposit will not be refunded. The fee will go into effect as of the publish date of the next *The Village Voice*.

Additional business brought before the council by Robins was a paving plan by ALDOT for Caldwell Mill Road and County 14. He explained the add/change/delete language to be included in the plan. Harrington made a motion that the resolution be adopted with Robins' changes. Councilman Trammell seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous.

Councilperson Harrington addressed the issue established at the last town meeting that the gate at the end of Indian Trail is blocking a public right of way and that the gate is in the limits of Indian Springs Village and is located on the right of way of the municipal road. She explained that a review of the law makes it clear that you cannot block a public right of way without vacating the public right of way which requires specific procedural processes including a public hearing. However, it is recognized that because of the condition of the road in that it is not maintained by either ISV or the county and that Google maps currently identifies it as an access to the park, there may be some reason to allow the gate to remain at least on a temporary basis. Harrington made a motion that the gate at the end of Indian Trail be allowed to remain on a temporary basis under the following conditions: (1) Private Road and No Trespassing signs are removed immediately and

no further signs placed on the gate by residents. (2) The ISV town clerk, North Shelby Fire Department, Pelham water authority and county engineer and State park as well as anyone else owning property along the road be given the gate code. (3) If the gate code is changed, that the above named entities be immediately notified of the change. (4) That public access to the right of way is not infringed upon by anyone, i.e. if someone wants to walk, run, ride a bicycle, a horse, picnic or any other recreation so long as it is contained to the public right of way their access and their right of way and access is not impeded. And should someone wish to have access by vehicle and request the code from our town clerk that they are so allowed. (5) If any of these conditions are not abided by others using the road, then the gate will be removed. Mendel seconded the motion. After additional discussion, Harrington amended her motion and changed the first sentence of her motion to say that the gate at the end of Indian Trail to remain on a temporary basis until the Town Council has time to arrive at a permanent solution. Mendel seconded the motion. The vote was five to one to accept the motion. Trammell stated that he could not support the motion because he was of the opinion that was a county controlled road and right of way. He read excerpts from an Attorney General opinion that, in summary, did not grant a municipality the authority to allow an electronic gate on a public road.

Stauss reported that there is an issue with Teklink and the proposed e-mail system. He has had two meetings and is waiting for them to give him additional information. He stated he will keep the council posted as to the outcome.

Trammell inquired about the status of the annexation issue on the Indian Crest Drive property. He gave an historical perspective on the parcels and the reason for not annexing the entire parcels. Discussion and information were exchanged.

Mayor Bell-Guercio announced that Representative Mary Sue McClurkin introduced Safe Dam legislation today in Montgomery. This is one step closer to accomplishing our goal. She also advised that the town credit card has been received. Also noted was on-going work with the Little Miss and Mr. Indian Springs pageant. The venue will be Oak Mountain Intermediate School on May 10, 2014 at 3:00 p.m. Entry forms along with rules and guidelines will be circulated in the immediate future. Also, the next community social is April 1st. Since April is tax season, our theme is "Death and Taxes." Join us for Po'boy's, Chex Mix and Death by Chocolate cake.

The Mayor adjourned the meeting at 8:50 p.m.

Town Council Meeting

April 1, 2014

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met at the Town Hall on Tuesday, April 1, 2014. The Mayor called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance. The Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present except Councilperson Kathryn Harrington.

The council meeting minutes of March 18, 2014 were reviewed and approved as written.

Chief Tyler reported there were a total of 135 calls in March to the Fire Department. Fire related calls were 45 and medical related were 90. He noted this is running within the average number of calls a month.

PAZ Chairman Wayne Jones reported that the notice of public hearing on revision of Zoning Ordinance had been posted April 1, 2014. The Planning and Zoning Meeting will be held April 8, 2014 at 7:00 p.m.; at this meeting it will be determined whether to make a recommendation to the Town Council to accept the revised Zoning Ordinance.

Councilman Mendel reviewed with the council the credit card statement and it was approved for payment.

Councilman Robins reported that he had written an article for *The Village Voice* concerning street signs asking residents not to attach anything to the town's road signs and posts other than temporary seasonal decorations which should be attached with zip ties. This problem has been discussed in the past and he hopes this will remind residents to be mindful of the town's signs.

Councilman Stauss reported that TekLink had installed our new e-mail system. He also explained that we will not be able to use them for our E-Blast. He is going to contact Constant Contact to establish an E-Blast system. Also, Frazier Christy had several items that need to be changed or included in our new web-site. Brian feels these changes are necessary and this needs to be done by FlexDigital. He will contact them regarding price.

Mayor Bell-Guercio asked that the discussion concerning the gate on the unpaved section of Indian Trail be postponed until the next council meeting. However, Councilman Robins read the following opinion from the Alabama League of Municipalities, which he had requested:

Although there is authority to close or vacate a public street, there is not any clear authority to limit access to public streets. Further, any obstruction or encroachment on a public street, whether it is caused by an individual or a municipality, constitutes a nuisance and is not allowed. McKenzie v. Commalander, 549 So. 2d 476 (ala. 1989). Thus, the gate would constitute a nuisance and is not allowed. In addition, such limited access could raise constitutional issues.

Bell-Guercio reminded everyone of the Easter Egg Hunt to be held at the Town Hall April 19, 2014 at 3:00 p.m. She asked for volunteers to help with the event.

Bell-Guercio also read the Proclamation that establishes April 1st as National Service Recognition Day.

Also discussed was the motion made March 18th that a \$100 refundable fee be required for use of the Town Hall. Additional considerations have come to light, therefore Stauss made a motion to rescind his previous motion. The vote was unanimous. More discussion will be forthcoming.

The Mayor adjourned the meeting at 7:30 p.m.

Volunteerism - the Heart of Indian Springs Village

Indian Springs Village is unique for many reasons. One of the most important reasons is that, from the very beginning, it was established by the founding fathers and mothers under the principle of volunteerism. The very first resolution ever passed by the Town Council voiced the town's mission statement. Resolution #91-02-26-01 states that, in general, the purpose for founding ISV and the goals of the town are to 'preserve, protect and enhance': the quality of life; the peaceful and uncluttered atmosphere; the beauty, serenity and tranquility; the integrity from commercialization; the right of self determination for ISV. The resolution further states that these goals "shall be achieved with a minimum amount of government involvement at minimal expense, and **relying primarily upon the voluntary efforts and support of community residents.**"

From the Mayor down, all town officials, (with the exception of the Town Clerk and Engineer) whether elected or appointed, are non-paid volunteers. And then, there's the Garden Club, the un-sung heroes that keep the Town Hall looking beautiful. The vast majority of these volunteers are not new. They've been volunteering for years – some since the town was formed. They don't volunteer because they don't have anything to do. They volunteer because they love and believe in ISV. The problem is, there is a huge lack of new volunteers and it's discouraging and concerning for an aging group of volunteers who serve a town formed on volunteerism. Everyone is busy, but there is no one so busy that they can't volunteer one morning to set up for the 4th of July or work with the Garden Club or serve one or two hours to set up for the Easter Egg Hunt or serve drinks or desserts on the 4th. If you really want to feel part of a community, volunteer. I promise you, it's worth it!

The men and women that had the vision for a beautiful town and the courage and self sacrifice to make it happen have provided us with a beautiful, unique community. We owe them a debt of gratitude and the best way to say 'thank you' is by volunteering. It is the 'heart' of Indian Springs Village.

Indian Springs School Launches Largest Capital Campaign in School's History

More than 300 Indian Springs School students, faculty, alumni and friends gathered on the ISS campus Friday, April 11 to celebrate the public launch of the \$20 million Campaign for Springs Eternal, the largest capital campaign in the school's history.

At a ceremony that kicked off Alumni Weekend 2014 festivities, ISS Director Gareth Vaughan, Board Chair Libby Pantazis and Campaign Co-Chair and alumnus Rusty Rushton '74 announced that the school will begin construction this summer on new classrooms and will continue planning for a new dining hall and new arts center to support and enhance the excellence of all programs and student life at the nationally recognized boarding and day school for grades 8-12.

Vaughan revealed that because of the generosity of more than 100 alumni, parents of alumni and current parents during the Campaign's silent phase (September 2013 to early April 2014), commitments of about \$15 million—75% of the fundraising goal—have been secured over the next five years. "It's incredibly exciting to be able to usher in this next chapter in Indian Springs School history," said Vaughan. "The passion and dedication that we are witnessing from the ISS community will give our students the tools they need to succeed in an increasingly global world and provide our world-class faculty a state-of-the-art stage on which to shine."

Lead gifts have come from Gillian and Mike Goodrich '63, Cecilia Matthews and the Estate of Alan Matthews '68, Mary and Rob Henrikson '65 and parents of alumni Judy and Hal Abrams, said Pantazis. "On behalf of the Board, I offer my deep appreciation to those who remember the importance of Indian Springs School in their own lives, to those who value the role of the school in the lives of their children and grandchildren, and to those who continue to make it a priority," she said. "You ensure the school's place for future generations."

The Campaign for Springs Eternal was created in response to Indian Springs School's new Campus Master Plan, which identifies the need to replace or modernize aging buildings dating from 1952, when the school opened its doors. Prepared by internationally recognized architects ArchitectureWorks, LLP, of Birmingham and Lake|Flato Architects of San Antonio with input from a wide range of ISS constituents—Board members, alumni, faculty, staff, students, parents and friends—the proposed plan impacts a large portion of the school campus and comprises three phases.

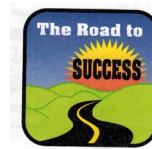
The proposed plan includes a) modernizing the campus and classrooms to accommodate emerging technologies for greater flexibility and global connectivity; b) replacing the current dining hall with a new dining hall that includes

an outdoor dining area, new appliances and flexibility to accommodate groups of various sizes; and c) creating a new arts center that features art studios, an art gallery and an outdoor art yard at the heart of the campus.

Construction on the classrooms phase is scheduled to begin in summer 2014.

Vaughan asked the entire Indian Springs community—alumni, parents, grandparents and friends—to join together in making a commitment to the Campaign, which will continue through 2018. To learn more and view the short Campaign for Springs Eternal video, visit ISSspringseternal.org.

Amateur Astronomer Speaks to Garden Club Members

A young college student who has always been fascinated by the heavens gave a slide presentation at the April 24 meeting of the Indian Springs Garden Club at the Town Hall, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Patrick Browning, a Birmingham native, has a dual interest in political science. The nineteen-year-old is currently enrolled at Jefferson State Community College, Valleydale Campus, in political science. He is guided by a desire for Christian mission work.

Browning is a member of the Birmingham Astronomical Society, an organization of amateur astronomers who meet every third Tuesday at the Samford University Planetarium. The Society holds monthly observing sessions at Chandler Mountain or at nearby Oak Mountain State Park. The closeness to the Marshall Space Flight Center and the Space & Rocket Center, Huntsville, affords its members outstanding opportunities for education.

In beginning his talk about astronomy, one of the oldest sciences, Browning began by showing a slide of Stonehenge, the ancient monument in Great Britain whose purpose for being constructed (about 2800-1800 B. C.) is not clear, but it is thought it was perhaps an astronomical observatory for marking specific events on the prehistoric calendar—eclipses, summer and winter solstices, etc.

Astronomy is one science to which amateurs have made many contributions. It is not to be confused with astrology, the belief that human affairs are correlated with positions of celestial objects, as predicted in horoscopes. Astronomy really began to thrive with the invention of the telescope, with the world-famous Hubble now providing so much information.

Slides of the North Star, many of the 88 constellations (only one-half of which are visible in the Northern Hemisphere), planets and other celestial bodies were shown. The speaker ended by showing the “gem of the universe”—Earth, which indeed is beautiful.

The devotional by Eleanor Bennett was very fittingly about God’s creation. Refreshments were then enjoyed.

On Thursday, May 22, 6:30 p.m. at the Town Hall Pavilion, members will hold their annual plant sale, or exchange, for the benefit of the club’s treasury.

Gardeners Plant Daffodils in Memory of Sandra Luster
