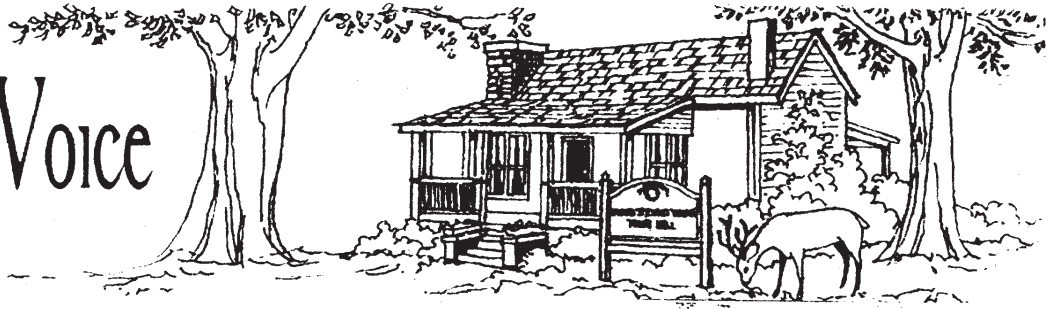

Summer is racing by. Our July Fourth Annual Parade and BBQ will be here before you know it, so get ready to enjoy a fabulous Independence Day Celebration with your fellow residents of Indian Springs.

I bet some of you are wondering why I haven't mentioned the dams in Oak Mountain State Park lately and reported to you on the findings from an Inundation Study the County took over last fall. As you may remember, Indian Springs had researched this and found an independent professional company that does this on an international basis and has been cited for their exemplary work. In order to accomplish this and be able to develop an Emergency Action Plan should there ever be a problem, we had offered to pay a share of the cost along with the County and Pelham since the State apparently had no money. The company had given me a very reasonable price and promised a finish date before school started Last Year! However, this was rejected by the County, and they took over the project.

I have been waiting for the results from the County and the company they subsequently chose to undertake this project which I understand is largely a software program once data has been input. The school year started and the company had not even been selected. Then around October or November, I asked again for an update and was told a company had been selected out of Mississippi. The study should be out the first of the year. The next time, it was early spring. The last time, it was May.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETINGS

May 5, 2015:

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, May 5, 2015. Mayor Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by the Boy Scouts that were in attendance. The Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present.

The minutes of April 21, 2015 were reviewed and discussed. Councilman Trammell wanted to add additional language to the minutes concerning the technical procedure of passing the Zoning Ordinance. Councilperson Harrington made a motion that this addition be considered and added to the minutes. Trammell seconded the motion. A voice vote was held and the results were as follows:

The minutes were accepted as written.

Wayne Jones, Chairman of PAZ, reported the Zoning Ordinance issue will be addressed at the next PAZ meeting.

Fire Chief Buddy Tyler reported that

in April, 2015 there were a total of 137 incidents; 44 fire and 93 medical related. Chief Tyler thanked Mayor Bell-Guercio for her letter to the Health Foundation. The \$24,000 grant was approved for the purchase of an ATV to be used by the fire department in certain emergency situations. He also shared a picture of the new transport unit. Additionally, he asked that the Council consider funding the BMES request. The Council did approve this expenditure.

Katie Guerin and Kate Etheridge, North Shelby Library, shared an update on the Library Summer Reading Program. She said they have over 170 programs for children, teens and adults this summer. She asked the Council to again consider financial support of this program. Councilman Robins made a motion that a \$2000 grant be made to the Library. Harrington seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous.

Robins presented two bids for painting the interior of the Town Hall to the Council. Harrington made a motion that \$5000 be approved for the interior painting and that the Building and Grounds Maintenance budget be increased by this amount. Stauss seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous.

Stauss informed the Council that the sweet gum tree had been cut into boards and were in his basement curing. He will make a bench and coat rack for the entrance of Town Hall when the wood has cured.

Trammell talked about the Building Code Ordinance and it was determined that he and Frazier Christy, Town Engineer, review the document and make changes if needed and then bring back to the Council for a vote. The Town Clerk polled the Council on status of Statement of Economic Interest Reports completed.

C.J. Guercio reported to the Council that he was trying to contact the pastor of the Indian Springs Baptist Church for discussions concerning partnering with ISV and using their grounds for the Farmers Market. They have not yet been able to connect. However, as late as it is in the season this project may not see results this year but will give more time to organize for next year.

May 19, 2015:

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, May 19, 2015. Mayor Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. The Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present except Councilman Brian Stauss.

The minutes of May 5, 2015 were reviewed and accepted as written.

Deputy Lee Stockman reported that there were 135 calls in April, the same number as in March. There were two thefts of property reported.

Councilman Mendel presented the April financials and they were discussed. Mendel made a motion they be accepted as presented, Councilperson Harrington seconded the motion and it carried unanimously.

Wayne Jones, Chairman of PAZ, reported the PAZ met on May 12th to discuss and review the Zoning Ordinance. There was discussion regarding revising the ZBA appointment section to follow the customary practice of the Town where the mayor

recommends and the council approves the appointments. The public meeting is set for June 4th at 7pm in the council meeting room.

Councilman Robins reported that Larry Rogers had made adjustments to the irrigation system, for a charge of \$155.00. He also wanted to thank the Garden Club for all their work at the Town Hall, especially Marge Dunn, Liz Alosi, and Nick and Jennifer Bondi. Mark Jabonski volunteered to do some heavy pruning and he wanted to thank him also.

The Council discussed the 4th of July plans and updates will be presented at the next council meeting.

Mendel had a procedural question concerning in-home businesses and their business license. The process was discussed and determined it is unclear in the Zoning Ordinance. This issue will be addressed in the Zoning Ordinance prior to passing the new ordinance.

It was reported by the Town Clerk that all Council members have filed their Statement of Economic Interest with the State. Trammell, stated as a matter of information, that these reports are public records.

Mayor Bell-Guercio reported that the Cahaba River Keepers will be doing some testing in ISV in the near future. The Town Clerk reported that she had been in contact with several municipalities in attendance at the Alabama League of Municipalities conference in regard to process and procedure of collecting cigarette tax in their municipalities. A discussion pursued and it was agreed that Councilman Trammell will look into the matter in depth.

The Farmers Market was discussed and even though it is too late in the season to work this summer, it appears that partnering with the ISV Baptist Church is an option and work will continue to make it happen next year.

There was a discussion on how illegal signs in ISV are becoming an increasing problem. In order to address the problem expeditiously, Bell-Guercio appointed Stauss to head a sign committee.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:00 P.M.

UA PR STUDENT EARNS PRESTIGIOUS GRANT TO INTERN AT BLACK WARRIOR RIVERKEEPER

Kristen Ellis, a native of Letohatchee, Ala., has received a grant from the Curtis and Edith Munson Foundation to work with the nonprofit clean water advocacy organization Black Warrior Riverkeeper. Ellis, a senior majoring in public relations at The University of Alabama, will be working as a communications intern for the group throughout the summer. This grant is the highest honor that the College of Communication and Information Sciences bestows on a student. UA's nationally ranked public relations program has received numerous awards in recent years.

"It's a huge honor to work with an organization like Black Warrior Riverkeeper that has such a great impact on my home state and is dedicated to preserving its natural beauty," said Ellis. "Being able to craft public relations strategies for an organization with such far-reaching influence is allowing me to apply what I've learned in the classroom and to stretch the limits of what I can really do."

Black Warrior Riverkeeper works to improve public health, recreation and wildlife habitat by monitoring the Black Warrior River basin, which drains parts of 17 Alabama counties. American Rivers, a national organization, selected the Black Warrior as one of America's Most Endangered Rivers due to the Shepherd Bend Mine proposal, which would be built on property primarily owned by The University of Alabama. The proposed coal mine site is directly across the river from a Birmingham Water Works Board intake that supplies drinking water to 200,000 people. Since 2007, Black Warrior Riverkeeper and a growing coalition of over 150 groups have urged UA System Trustees to stop the proposal and thus protect not only the river but also the people that would be impacted by polluted drinking water and increased water bills.

Black Warrior Riverkeeper has steadily forged many positive partnerships with groups at The University of Alabama, including the Alabama Panhellenic Association, UA Center for Sustainable Service & Volunteerism, UA Center for Ethics and Social Responsibility, UA Department of Advertising and Public Relations, UA Environmental Council, UA Environmental Law Society, UA Museums, UA NAACP and numerous UA professors, students, employees and alumni. 542 volunteers generously donated 6,898 community service hours through Black Warrior Riverkeeper projects last year. The vast majority of those volunteers were UA students.

The Curtis and Edith Munson Foundation funds the conservation of natural resources in North America and the Caribbean Basin with emphasis on the United States. The relationship between the Curtis and Edith Munson Foundation, The University of Alabama and Black Warrior Riverkeeper will benefit over a million people living throughout the Black Warrior River watershed, in addition to countless visitors.

"We are so grateful that the Curtis and Edith Munson Foundation supports our exciting partnership with The University of Alabama's nationally ranked PR program," said Charles Scribner, Executive Director of Black Warrior Riverkeeper.

"In addition to providing financial support directly to conservation organizations, the Munson Foundation developed a partnership with the Department of Advertising and Public Relations at The University of Alabama," said Dr. Joseph Phelps, chairman of the department. "The student receives the financial support and excellent experience, and the nonprofit organizations benefit from the student's efforts in an area that they typically do not have the funds to staff on a full-time basis."

Black Warrior Riverkeeper's mission is to protect and restore the Black Warrior River and its tributaries. The citizen-based nonprofit clean water advocacy organization promotes clean water for the sake of public health, recreation, and wildlife habitat throughout the Black Warrior River watershed. PARADE REGISTRATION: Be set up and ready to register at 10:00 a.m. at the Winn Dixie Marketplace (corner of Valleydale and Caldwell Mill) parking lot on Valleydale Road.
