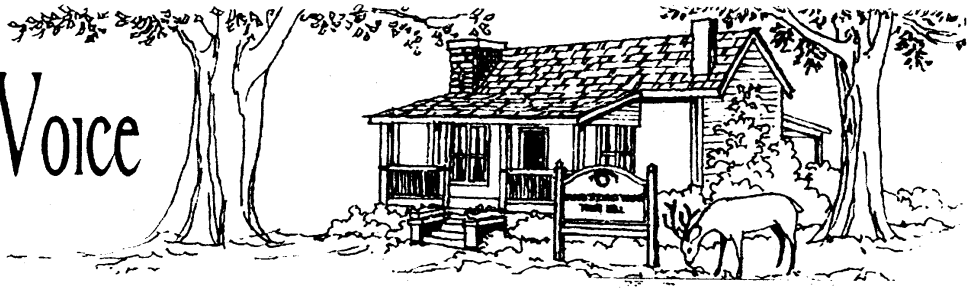

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

As my four year term as Mayor draws to a close, I wanted to express to the people of Indian Springs Village what a pleasure and an honor it has been to serve you. I could not have asked for a better group of people to work with than the Council composed of Bart Trammell, Brian Stauss, Kathryn Harrington, Jack Mendel, and Herb Robins. My sincere thanks go to Joan Downs, Town Clerk Extraordinaire, who has made my job so easy and deserves a mountain of credit for all she does.

In thinking back over the last four years, I am proud of what we as a Council have accomplished. We pushed relentlessly for an Inundation Study of the dams at Oak Mountain State Park, which was accomplished, and now are continuing to monitor the development of an Emergency Action Plan by the County to be proactive if the need ever occurs. We staunchly supported the placement of School Resource Officers at our schools and successfully encouraged other municipalities to do so. Now this has become a standard security practice in our schools.

We set up a Clerk's Office in the Town Hall which is now manned with regular hours. We were also able to have our Town Hall placed on the Alabama Historical Registry. We implemented our new Website, and use that as well as eblasts and the Village Voice to keep our residents informed. The Village Voice also now comes in hard copy by mail as well as electronically. We introduced having a social with dinner before the first meeting of every month to allow residents and council members to interact and converse in an informal atmosphere. We now have patriotic flags lining our main thoroughfare for Holidays such as the Fourth of July, and a beautiful framed memorial on parchment is hanging in our Town Hall with the names of those that purchased a flag and who they were honoring.

Fire Chief, Buddy Tyler, negotiated for us to purchase additional fire hydrants that helped upgrade our fire safety rating. We had the most wonderful gala to celebrate the **town's 25th Anniversary** including a steak dinner, terrific

band, and a silent auction to raise money for **our Children's Fund**. We welcomed Wal-Mart into our town, and we have been the recipient of several grants from them. We passed a Storm Water Ordinance and an Erosion Control Ordinance that will help protect citizens from flooding.

Most recently, we have supported the establishment of an Indian Springs Village Farmers Market, and will continue to work with that Board to ensure its success. We believe this is a great means of encouraging a sense of community and hope it flourishes and expands. In the same vein, we are about to embark on the development of an Indian Springs Village Kiwanis Club which is another excellent means of bringing our Indian Springs family together in a way that will serve others and circle back to serve us as a community. Our new multipurpose building currently under construction behind the Pavilion will house a small meeting room and kitchen, bathrooms, storage, and a special climate controlled storage space for town documents.

Let me say again how much I have enjoyed serving as your Mayor and working with a great Council and Town Clerk. I would be honored to continue to do so for four more years.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

May 17, 2016

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, May 17, 2016. Mayor Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. Boy Scout Jack Rodgers, from Troop 533, was in attendance in order to earn his Citizenship and Community Badge, and he led the Pledge of Allegiance. The Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present.

The minutes of May 3rd were reviewed and accepted as written.

Bell-Guercio introduced Brian Rodgers, Alabama District Chair, and Robert Brown, Lt. Governor of the Kiwanis Club. The purpose of their visit was to share about the opportunity of chartering a Kiwanis Club of Indian Springs. The council was very enthusiastic over the possibility of a charter and discussed how it could be mutually beneficial to the community. As a result of discussion, it was agreed the next step will be to look at a

date in late July to host an information/interest meeting for community members with a goal of having 25 charter members. Rodgers will draft an article about the information meeting for *The Village Voice*. He will also be working on other avenues to enhance the interest of potential members.

Councilman Robins reported that Shelby County Health Department has approved the septic tank application for the new multi-purpose building. He also updated the council on the progress of having the dangerous dead trees removed from vacated property at 2644 Buckboard Road. Our Town Attorney has ordered a title binder to find out who indeed owns the property. He is also working on having the court issue an order for the Town to issue requests for bids for tree removal and clean up. He also reported he had been in touch with Mr. Gilliland with regard to hanging our American Flags for Memorial Day, Flag Day and Fourth of July.

Councilman Mendel, who is also the Town Safety Officer, noted that the Town once again received a Gold Award for safety from our insurance company. He also remarked the Local Highway Finance Report-2015 has been filed with Alabama Department of Transportation. Mendel presented the April financial statements which were reviewed and discussed. He moved that the April financials be accepted as presented. Councilman Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Councilman Trammell presented the fifth of the eleven step process of annexing 2634 Valleydale Road. He made a motion that the council consider the fifth of the eleven step annexation request ordinance 2016-010 as presented. Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous. Additionally, Trammell presented an annexation request for 237 Indian Forest Trail. After discussion, Harrington made a motion to suspend the rules, Stauss seconded and the roll call vote was unanimous. Trammell moved that ordinance 2016-011 annexation request be approved as presented. Harrington seconded and the vote was unanimous. Moreover, Trammell explained that there were a couple of errors on a recently passed ordinance, therefore he offered ordinance 2016-005 which corrects the ordinance number and parcel number. Trammell moved that the rules be suspended, Robins seconded and the roll call vote was unanimous. Trammell made a motion that ordinance 2016-005 be accepted as presented, Harrington seconded and the vote was unanimous.

It was reported by the Town Clerk that all Council members have filed their Statement of Economic Interest with the State.

Bell-Guercio adjourned the meeting at 8:35 P.M.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

June 7, 2016

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, June 7, 2016. Mayor Bell-Guercio called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. Following the Pledge of Allegiance the Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present except Councilperson Kathryn Harrington.

The minutes of May 17th were reviewed and accepted as written.

Chief Buddy Tyler related an incident last week at the Southeastern Bible College. The fire department responded to a fire alarm call and when they arrived a fire was smoldering in the storage room where oily rags had been stored in a bucket. He cautioned everyone that oily rags should be separated not placed in a container together. Additionally, he advised everyone to be cautious, with rising temperatures, heat strokes can occur. He also advised that June is the last month for hydrant testing.

Mayor Bell-Guercio introduced Ed Zwilling, an ISV resident and Americans with Disabilities Act attorney. Mr. Zwilling will serve as a consultant and will identify and recommend changes needed to make sure we are in compliance with the ADA law. He did a walk-through of the property and will e-mail us his list of recommended changes.

Councilman Robins reported that he has ordered the dumpster and fans for the 4th of July celebration and reviewed with the council the three quotes received for catering the BBQ. The quotes were similar in price but Jim N Nicks offered more pounds of meat, more servers, along with the lowest price. The council accepted their bid. Robins also reported that the City Attorney will be filing a complaint seeking the town to clean up the vacated property located on Buckboard Rd.

Councilman Mendel asked for an update on the **Farmer's Market**. **Town Clerk advised that to date it has been very successful.** John Willoughby, State of Alabama Farmers Market Authority, attended the launch in May and was very impressed with attendance and vendors.

Councilman Trammell presented the sixth of the eleven step process of annexing 2634 Valleydale Road. He made a motion that the council consider the sixth of the eleven step annexation request ordinance 2016-012 as presented. Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

The council was honored to have in attendance, State Representative Arnold Mooney and his wife Kelly. Mooney described his role in the past legislative session and apprised us of the three goals that are on the **Governor's agenda; 1) Medicaid 2) Prison Bond Issue 3) BP Settlement Funds.** Bell-Guercio thanked

Rep. Mooney for sharing his firsthand knowledge of State happenings.

Bell-Guercio adjourned the meeting at 8:00 P.M.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETING

June 21, 2016

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met Tuesday, June 21, 2016. Pro Tem Herb Robins called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. Thomas and Cole Otts of Troop 533 were in attendance to achieve their Communications and Citizenship in the Community award and they led the Pledge of Allegiance. The Town Clerk called the roll and all council members were present except Mayor Brenda Bell-Guercio.

The minutes of June 7th were reviewed and accepted as written.

Deputy Turner reported burglaries on Meadow Brook Rd. and Windwood Circle over Memorial Day weekend.

Councilman Jack Mendel presented the May financial statements and noted that budget items that were approved by council are now reflected in the financials. After council review Mendel made a motion to endorse the May financials as presented, Councilman Trammell seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Trammell presented the seventh step process of annexing 2634 Valleydale Road. He made a motion that the council consider the seventh of the eleven step annexation request Ordinance 2016-014 as presented. Stauss seconded and the vote was unanimous.

Robins presented the Fee Schedule Ordinance that was tabled from the June 7th meeting. The council reviewed the Ordinance and Councilperson Harrington made a motion to accept Ordinance 2016-013 as presented. Trammell seconded the motion and the vote was unanimous.

Additionally, Robins reported that the property owners of 2644 Buckboard Rd. came forward and removed the dangerous trees from the aforementioned property therefore; the town will not need to proceed with any litigation.

Wayne Jones reported that he is waiting on fence plans from Jim Loper. He would like to see the Boy Scouts construct a decorative wooden fence on the front of Town Hall property. He also would like to include in the project the punch list received from Ed Zwilling in order to have us compliant with the ADA law.

Robins adjourned the meeting at 7:42 p.m.

ISV CHILDREN'S FUND

Dear ISV Citizens,

I am reaching out to our citizens this month in hopes that you would consider contributing to our **Children's Fund, early rather than later. Now rather than later**, when things get hectic and sometimes just become overwhelming with charitable giving requests, will put you ahead of the seasonal madness.

For the newcomers in our Town, who are not aware, ISV raises money each year to provide Christmas gifts for the less fortunate children in our local school systems. In 2015, ISV was able to provide funds to provide clothing, shoes, personal items and toys for 23 children. Our goal is to provide \$200 per child.

ISV has been privileged for the past two years to receive a \$1000 grant from a local retailer. However, this year our grant was only \$500. This is a huge deficient to overcome. We plan to continue the silent auction but not on the same level as last year. The grant, the flower sell, silent auction and your generous contributions are the ways in which we raise money for our children. Furthermore, I am open to any suggestions as to how we can raise additional funds this year. A few years ago I belonged to a local Bunco group. We put our money in a fund that was distributed to a charity at the end of the year; in **2014 the group donated \$835 to the ISV Children's Fund.** If you are involved with a group that is looking for a charity to support, please recommend **our ISV Children's Fund.** Please contact me and share your thoughts and ideas.

On behalf of me and the Town Council we want to thank Hayden Belisle, Counselor at Oak Mountain Elementary School, who personally shops for each child. The gifts are given to the parents prior to Christmas break and the parents are able to give the gifts to their children without the stigma of charity. The children are able to experience the Joy of Christmas rather than disappointment. Hayden you are a blessing as are these precious children.

As a Town, we have set the bar very high; \$4,600 was raised last year. Without your generous contributions, we **will not be able to meet last year's** contribution. Please send in your contribution today or put us on your seasonal giving list.

The 32 varieties of ferns highlighted the 30-minute tour of **President Mickey Farmer's** garden on Parkside Circle on a warm Thursday evening, June 23, with 12 members present.

Requirements to produce healthy, vibrant ferns include soil high in organic matter, such as compost, filtered shade, and moderate moisture retention. Members shared their stories of successful and not-so-successful fern growing efforts. As an added bonus they were able to select to take home the fern of their choice from the many potted over the spring. Advice was given as to the specific needs of the ferns.

Member Robyn Morris also shared milkweed plants for the gardeners to plant to attract Monarch and other butterflies, so beneficial to gardens. Milkweed is essential **for the Monarch's caterpillar stage of their life cycle.**

Members went inside the cool home to enjoy refreshments and for the business meeting. Plans were made for the flower arrangements for the annual ISV Fourth of July barbeque. Treasurer Jennifer Bondi was directed to send a \$60.00 check to the **Indian Springs Village Children's Fund.** **The check represents money** donated at the recent May 26 plant exchange and also from the sale of ISV car tags at the Saturday, May 28 first-ever **Farmers' Market in Indian Springs Village.**

In other news, at our June 25 Saturday Market booth, coordinated by recently-retired President Liz Alosi, the **topic was bees, and the children's** craft activity was a bee fan. Pamphlets containing bee information were available for distribution, as well as dunk tablets to be placed in birdbaths to kill mosquito larva without harming the environment or wildlife.

The Garden Club will not meet in July. If you happen to have bought too many vegetables at the ISV Farmer's Market or you just need to clean out the frig, here is a great way to use all those fresh vegetables!

Summer Vegetable Pasta Salad

- 1 box bowtie pasta or whatever you have on hand, penne works great
 - 2 medium roma tomatoes
 - 1 medium summer squash
 - 1 medium zucchini
 - 1 medium broccoli crown
 - ½ medium red onion
 - Any other vegetable that you have on hand
1. Follow package directions for cooking pasta
 2. while the pasta is cooking, prepare the vegetables by cutting into bite size pieces.
 3. Put squash, zucchini, and onion into colander. Pour water from pasta over the vegetables along with pasta and let drain.
 4. In a large bowl, add vegetable pasta mixture along with remaining vegetables.
 5. Lightly toss with your favorite Italian Dressing or vinaigrette, salt and pepper to taste and add any fresh herbs you may have (oregano, thyme, basil, chopped)
 6. Also, if you like, add some cooked shrimp; you have an all in one meal!

A note to those anticipating the landing of a huge jet on a short air strip---As soon as the plane touched down at the Tuscaloosa Airport, the pilot immediately reversed **the engines' thrust and simultaneously hit the brakes to give him ample time to maneuver the 737-800 down the airstrip and onto the taxi runway.**

I would encourage all veterans to put a similar flight **on their "bucket list". Don't wait until you are too old and have physical limitations----go for it NOW!!!!**

OAK MOUNTAIN NAMED TOP TEAM IN COUNTRY

The awards for the 2016 Oak Mountain boys soccer teams just keep rolling in. After repeating as the 7A state champions this season and finishing the year with an undefeated, 28-0-2 record, the Eagles have been pulling in a plethora of postseason awards. First Oak Mountain was named the top boys soccer program in the USA Today/NSCAA Super 25 Spring Boys National Poll, and now the Eagles have been named the best prep team in America for the 2015-16 school year, regardless of sport.

Twenty-one prep teams were selected from across the country to take part in this competition.
