Town Council Meeting

November 15, 2005

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met on Tuesday, November 15, 2005 at 7:00 PM at the Indian Springs Village Town Hall.

Town Clerk Shirley Church called the roll and noted the presence of Mayor Steve Zerkis, Council Members Herb Robins, Brian Stauss, Brenda Bell Guercio and Jack Mendel. Also present was Assistant Town Clerk Jim Wyatt, Administrative Assistant Bart Trammell and Planning & Zoning Chairman Wayne Jones.

The minutes of the November 01, 2005 council meeting were accepted as amended on a motion by Robins; seconded by Mendel.

The October 2005 financial report was accepted on a motion by Mendel; seconded by Stauss.

Jones presented a plat application combining the four Rite-Aid parcels into one parcel. The Planning and Zoning Commission has recommended approval of the application request. The application was unanimously accepted on a motion by Robins; seconded by Stauss.

Robins announced he is still working on a report to verify how many miles of road for which Indian Springs Village currently has maintenance responsibility according to State laws.

Robins reported the Emergency Disaster Relief Kit in CD format from the Alabama League of Municipalities will be available at no cost to each municipality in the first quarter of 2006.

There was discussion regarding a report presented by **Mendel** indicating his findings on the possible use of impact fees within our town.

Guercio reported the need for donations to the ISV Children's Fund. Marge Robins will continue to coordinate shopping for the children's gifts. Guercio also stressed the need for volunteers to assist Margie. Margie can be contacted at 980-9217. An article will be placed in the next issue of *The Village Voice*.

Guercio announced the Annual ISV Christmas Party will be held on December 20th where she plans to have a donation container for the ISV Children's Fund.

We understand there will be a visit by a certain bearded gentleman in a red suit to visit the Indian Springs Village children at the town hall on December 10th.

Stauss reported the parlor and dining room of the town hall will be painted in the near future. He announced there will be an annexation committee meeting next Monday, November 21, at 7:00 p.m. to discuss possible parcels that could be considered for annexation and all who are interested are invited to attend this meeting.

There was discussion regarding some areas of ISV experiencing drainage problems.

There was general discussion regarding the selection of an auditor for ISV.

There was discussion regarding the Cease and Desist letters sent by the County and Mayor Zerkis regarding dumping of dirt and construction debris on a flood plain in and around Caldwell Mill Road and Highway 119. Amanda Lowery, ADEM, has talked to the property owner regarding this situation and will contact our Town Engineer. This situation is also being reviewed by our Town Attorney, Russ Allison.

Meeting was adjourned on a motion by Zerkis.

Town Council Meeting

December 6, 2005

The Indian Springs Village Town Council met on Tuesday, December 6, 2005 at 7:00 PM at the Indian Springs Village Town Hall.

Town Clerk Shirley Church called the roll and noted the presence of Mayor Steve Zerkis, Council Members Herb Robins, Brian Stauss, Brenda Bell Guercio and Jack Mendel. Also present were Administrative Assistant Bart Trammell and Planning & Zoning Chairman Wayne Jones.

The minutes of the November 15, 2005 council meeting were accepted on a motion by Guercio; seconded by Robins.

Robins stated the road report concerning Indian Springs Village's road maintenance responsibilities has been completed. Pursuant to the procedures set out in the Code of Alabama, Sections 11-49-80 and 11-49-81, ISV is responsible for approximately two miles of road out of approximately fourteen miles within our town limits. These are portions of dedicated roads adjacent to properties annexed into ISV after July 7, 1995 and which are bounded on both sides by ISV. All other roads are either the responsibility of the County, the State or are undedicated roads which are not maintained by any governmental entity.

Robins announced Margie Robins along with Oak Mountain School Counselors will be shopping for families within our school system. Funding is provided through the ISV Children's Fund. Any volunteers to assist in this effort will be appreciated. We have approximately twice as many children in need this year.

Guercio reported she would have a box available at the Town Hall for ISV Children's Fund donations. She said the Shelby County Humane Society has been given approval to hold their fundraising function at the ISV Town Hall next spring.

Trespassing and Hunting

Stauss reported there was an ISV annexation committee meeting on November 21. The committee continued discussions regarding an annexation vision for the City. Stauss reported Shelby Food Mart has agreed to allow us to use their facility as one of our four sites for posting of legal notices.

Stauss reported Shelby Food Mart is having drainage problems adjacent to the highway. Robins will contact State Highway Department District Engineer Gary Ray to investigate this problem.

Zerkis discussed the situation regarding dumping of dirt and construction debris on the flood plain of a lot at the Caldwell Mill Road/AL Highway 119 intersection and on an adjoining lot on 119 owned by Messrs. Maddox.

There was discussion regarding a flooding problem At Old Mill Road and McGuire Road. The County will be contacted regarding this situation.

There was discussion regarding the selection of an auditor for the town.

Meeting was adjourned on a motion by Zerkis.

Several of our home owners are informing their neighbors individually by letter that continued trespassing on their property must stop. Apparently there has been trespassing on these properties for some time by campers, dirt bikes and all-terrain vehicles and the like, but recently it has become very ugly. Several boys set up a hunting blind and have been baiting the area with corn. They have shot several deer with bows and arrows. Recently a pregnant deer was mortally wounded and left to die, after which she was butchered. The details get more gruesome and I will not go into them.

It's against State law to hunt over bait such as corn. Trespassing is also against the law. The property owners have verbally asked trespassers to not come on their property and have been ignored. They have now talked to the Shelby County Sheriff and the State Game Warden. I'm bringing this to your attention because these neighbors are simply asking for cooperation in what has become a very nasty matter.

One more thing for everyone's information. The Alabama Power towers and lines are located on private property. Alabama Power has an easement from the individual property owners to run their high voltage power lines. Alabama Power does not own the property on which its towers are located, so if there is trespassing on that easement, that trespassing is occurring on private property.



If you are receiving this newsletter for the first time, or only recently, chances are you are not actually in the incorporated limits of Indian Springs Village but right on the very edge, in unincorporated Shelby county. We'd like to invite you to join and be annexed into our Town. There are some nice benefits of being in the Town with no costs to you. The Town has no property taxes. That means the only taxes you pay are those the county has been levying on you and we don't add anything to that. By being in Indian Springs Village, your government is local and close to you. We are easy to reach if you have any questions or suggestions, only a phone call away. Our Town Council meetings are twice a month on the first and third Tuesdays at 7:00 PM and you are welcome to attend and share your comments. Our Town Hall is available for private meetings and parties at no cost. We do distribute and hand deliver a monthly newsletter of Town activities, the one you are reading now. We have four annual events at the Town Hall and Pavilion that are opportunities to meet neighbors, share some food and pastries and generally have a good time: Easter Egg Hunt, Fourth of July, Founders Day in October and the Christmas Holiday party.

How do we function with no property taxes? We do get small amounts of revenue from the state and from fees on utilities. We can survive on this because we are frugal and maintain a low cost government. Our biggest asset is the time spent by many, many volunteers to help make Indian Springs Village a very good town in which to live.

If you would like to be annexed, the process is very easy. Please call our Assistant Town clerk, Jim Wyatt at 205 988-0327 and he will be glad to send you the application form. When you return the completed form, we will obtain some documents from Shelby County that give us the legal description of your property. These documents will be introduced to the Town Council in the form of an ordinance to accept your property into the town. It's as simple as that, and there are no fees or costs to do this. So, come on in. If you have any questions, please feel free to call Jim Wyatt, or me at 733-9935, and we will be glad to discuss the process.
